**PERSONNEL SELECTION AND CLASSIFICATION
SELECTION AND TRAINING OF ARMY AVIATION OFFICERS**

Effective 15 October 1970

This is a complete revision of AR 611-110 and changes are made throughout. Local supplementation of this regulation is prohibited except upon approval of the Chief of Personnel Operations, ATTN: OPDAA.

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*This regulation supersedes AR 611-110, 24 June 1967, including all changes; DA message 857256, 23 March 1968; DA message 909704, 21 May 1969; and DA message 919492, 27 May 1969.

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CHAPTER 1

GENERAL

1-1. Purpose. This regulation establishes criteria for eligibility and procedures for selection of male commissioned officers and warrant officers of the active Army, Army National Guard, and Army Reserve volunteering for Army aviation flight training.

1-2. General. a. The word "officer," when used in this regulation, includes both commissioned and warrant officers and, unless specifically modified herein, pertains to all components of the U.S. Army.

b. Only volunteers are selected for training as Army aviators.

c. Graduates of the prescribed courses of initial flight training in fixed and rotary wing aircraft will be designated as Army aviators in accordance with AR 600-106 and will be awarded the MOS code appropriate to their aircraft qualifications in accordance with AR 611-101 or AR 611-112.

d. Utilization of active Army commissioned officers designated as Army aviator will be in accordance with AR 600-105 and DA Pamphlet 600-3. Warrant officer aviators will be utilized in accordance with AR 611-112 and DA Pamphlet 600-11. Selected Army aviators may be cross trained in the other type aircraft as required.

e. Elimination from a previous course of military sponsored flight instruction for flying or academic deficiencies, disciplinary reasons, lack of motivation, or voluntary withdrawal in-lieu-of board action normally precludes entry or re-entry into the Army aviation flight training program.

1-3. Flight training courses. Current Army

aviation flight training courses, for officers not designated as Army aviators, provide for qualification of officers as fixed or rotary wing aviators. These courses are listed in DA Pamphlet 350-10.

1-4. Service obligation and utilization. a. All active Army officers, except Reserve Officer AROTC Flight Training Program graduates, selected for and entered into an initial flight training course will incur a three-year obligation. This obligation will be computed from the date of course completion or termination of attendance thereat, whichever is earlier. Officers involuntarily removed from the flight training program for medical unfitness or flight ineptness will revert to the obligation existing prior to application for training plus an additional obligation of one year, computed from termination of last previously existing obligation.

b. Those officers who enter active Army flight training as AROTC Flight Training Program graduates are obligated to serve the active duty requirements outlined in AR 145-1 and DA Form 597-1 (Army ROTC Supplemental Agreement—Flight Instruction).

c. Normally, active Army aviators will serve their utilization tour in an aviation assignment immediately following successful completion of Army aviation flight training. Officers of the Army National Guard and Army Reserve should be utilized in an aviation assignment in a unit of the Army National Guard or U.S. Army Reserve immediately following successful completion of the flight training course.

CHAPTER 2

PREREQUISITES

2-1. For applicants in grade of warrant officer, lieutenant, and captain. The prerequisites in *a* through *g* below are established for these personnel. An applicant must—

a. Volunteer for training in fixed and rotary wing aircraft. The volunteer statement may include a statement of preference as to the type of initial training desired.

b. Be under 30 years of age at time of application. Waiver of age requirements for applicants will be considered only for those individuals who have previous military or civil aviation experience, including aircraft maintenance or aeronautical engineering.

c. Attain or exceed a composite score of 155 on the Officer Battery of the Flight Aptitude Selection Tests (FAST-OB). Procedures for accomplishing the prescribed testing are contained in paragraph 2-2.

d. Have completed no more than 48 months active commissioned service prior to entry into flight training.

e. Meet the following service requirements:

(1) Be assigned to a branch of service authorized Army aviation; or, if not assigned to such a branch, request and be accepted for transfer to one of those branches. Branches authorized aviation are Armor, Air Defense Artillery, Engineer, Field Artillery, Infantry, Medical Service, Military Intelligence, Military Police, Signal, and Transportation.

(2) Officers of the Regular Army assigned to Armor, Air Defense Artillery, Field Artillery, Infantry, Corps of Engineers, or Signal Corps will complete the following before entry into flight training:

(*a*) Branch basic officers course, except those officers exempted from attending basic course by Headquarters, Department of the Army Policy.

(*b*) Mandatory training as prescribed in AR 350-5.

(*c*) A minimum of one year troop duty exclusive of (*a*) and (*b*) above.

(3) Officers of the Regular Army assigned to the Military Intelligence Branch, Military Police

Corps, and Transportation Corps must complete the following before entry into flight training:

(*a*) Combat arms branch officer course.

(*b*) Mandatory training as prescribed in AR 350-5.

(*c*) One year combat arms branch detail exclusive of (*a*) and (*b*) above.

(*d*) Basic officers course or appropriate phase as prescribed by the officer's branch. Attendance may be delayed until after the officer concerned completes the Army flight training course.

(*e*) Officers integrated into the Regular Army are not required to be detailed to a combat branch if they are integrated in the grade of captain or above and are not required to comply with (*a*) above.

(4) Officers of the Regular Army assigned to the Medical Service Corps will complete their branch basic officers course before entry into flight training.

(5) Army National Guard and Army Reserve officers on extended active duty must have received credit for their basic course.

(6) Warrant officers are exempted from the requirements of this paragraph.

(7) For Army National Guard and Army Reserve officers not on active duty—

(*a*) Army National Guard officers must be federally recognized (see NGR 95) and have received credit for their branch basic course.

(*b*) Army Reserve officers must be members of a Reserve unit and be participating actively.

(*c*) Warrant officers must have been a member of an Army National Guard unit or of the USAR in an active status for a minimum of one year. CONUS Army commanders, major oversea commanders, and the Chief, National Guard Bureau may grant a waiver of this one year requirement.

(8) Previous flying experience is not required. However, those applicants who previously have been awarded a U.S. military aeronautical rating as pilot or naval aviator

may complete certain phases of instruction on a proficiency basis at the discretion of the appropriate school commandant as outlined in AR 600-106.

2-2. For applicants in grades above captain. A limited number of officers on active duty in the grades above captain may be entered into flight training to fill established aviation requirements. The Chief, National Guard Bureau and Chief, Army Reserve may authorize officers above the grade of captain to enter flight training as required. Determination of the numbers by grade to be selected will be accomplished by Headquarters, Department of the Army. World-wide message announcement will be made concerning numbers to be trained, when applications should be submitted, and cut-off date for applications to reach Department of the Army. Officers volunteering for flight training under this paragraph must have sufficient service remaining prior to mandatory retirement to complete a 3-year service obligation. The following are prerequisites for application:

a. Colonel and lieutenant colonel (promotable).

(1) No more than 24 years promotion list service as of cut-off date for application.

(2) Have credit for completion of a senior service college, be on selection list, or be in attendance at a senior service college. Personnel participating in the U.S. Army War College Non-resident Course must be able to complete the course and enter training during the fiscal year for which quotas are announced.

b. Lieutenant colonel.

(1) No more than 20 years promotion list service as of cut-off date for application.

(2) Have credit for completion of C&GSC level school, be on selection list, or be in attendance.

(3) Have credit for battalion level command, or have experience as chief of a special or general staff section at division or higher echelon.

c. Major.

(1) No more than 15 years promotion list service as of cut-off date for application.

(2) Have credit for completion of branch career course.

(3) Have credit for company level command.

2-3. **Aptitude for flight training.** a. All applicants except colonels and lieutenant colonels

(promotable) will be tested with the Officer Battery of the Flight Aptitude Selection Tests (FAST-OB). Commanders will insure that applicants are afforded the opportunity to accomplish the prescribed testing prior to submission of applications to Department of the Army. The first indorsement to the application will state the date the FAST-OB was administered and the attained scores as follows: FAST-OB composite score, rotary wing score, and fixed wing score.

b. Procedures for requisitioning and safeguarding test material required to administer and score the FAST-OB are contained in DA Pamphlet 310-8 and AR 611-5. Test administration will be conducted by qualified personnel in accordance with AR 611-5. Reserve component applicants may be tested under the supervision of ARNG or USAR advisors. When required, advisors will be appointed as Test Control Officers for this purpose.

c. Completed test answer sheets will be forwarded by fastest mail to a centralized scoring activity designated by the appropriate CONUS Army or major command headquarters where the tests will be scored under the supervision of the Test Control Officer.

d. Requisition for scoring materials for the FAST-OB (DA Forms 6256, 6257-2, 6259-2, and 6260-2) will refer to the special orders number on which TCO designation was made as authorization for requisitioning these test components. Designated TCO will be limited in initial requisitions to not more than three sets of scoring keys. Additional orders for scoring keys will require justification.

e. DA Form 6256 (FAST Scoring Worksheet) will be used by the central scoring activity to compute the FAST-OB composite score, the rotary wing score, and the fixed wing score for each applicant. DA Form 6256 will be prepared in triplicate. Two copies will be forwarded by fastest mail to the appropriate commanding officer with personnel records responsibility, who will dispose of the copies as prescribed in *f* below. The third copy of the DA Form 6256 for each applicant, along with the scored FAST answer sheet for all applicants, regardless of scores attained, will be mailed to the U.S. Army Behavioral Science Research Laboratory, ATTN: CRDBSRL-DOL3, 1320 Wilson

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Boulevard, Arlington, VA 22209. Scored test answer sheets are considered controlled test material and will be packaged for shipment in accordance with instructions contained in AR 611-5. In packaging answer sheets for shipment, answer sheets will not be folded, creased, pinned, clipped, stapled, torn, or otherwise altered.

f. Upon receipt of two copies of DA Form 6256 from the scoring facility, the commander will insure that FAST test scores are accurately reported in item 33, DA Form 68 (Officer Qualification Record) as in the following example: FAST-OB Com-280: RW-150: FW 130: (date admin-

istered). One copy of DA Form 6256 will be filed in the semi-permanent portion of DA Form 201 (Military Personnel Records Jacket U.S. Army). The second copy of DA Form 6256 will be attached to the application for flight training and used in completing the first indorsement to the application as required by *a* above.

g. Retests of applicants with the FAST-OB are not authorized. Failure to achieve a qualifying composite score of 155 or higher on the FAST-OB upon initial testing will preclude any further consideration of the individual concerned for initial flight training.

CHAPTER 3

MEDICAL QUALIFICATIONS

3-1. General. Final determination of medical fitness for all Army initial flight training programs will be made by The Surgeon General. Direct communication between medical examining facilities and The Surgeon General is authorized for this purpose.

3-2. Examination. All applicants for Army flight training will undergo a type "B" medical examination for flying duty as prescribed in chapter 10 and appendix IX, AR 40-501, according to the following schedule:

a. AROTC Flight Training Program graduates as the initial active duty medical examination.

b. United States Military Academy and ROTC Distinguished Military Graduates, who accepted regular commissions and elected Army flight training prior to graduation, six months prior to scheduled completion of the troop duty outlined in paragraph 2-1.

c. Senior Officer Flight Training applicants as directed in the specific DA message announcing training quotas.

d. All other applicants within 90 days preceding date of application.

3-3. Medical standards. The following classes of medical fitness standards will apply as designated for determining medical qualification for entry into the flight training programs:

a. Classes 1 and 1A. As prescribed in chapter 4, AR 40-501.

b. Class 1A (modified). As prescribed in chapter 7, AR 40-501. This is the same as Class 1A except:

(1) Vision—uncorrected distant or near visual acuity no worse than 20/100 in each eye which must correct to 20/20 in each eye.

(2) Refractive error (cycloplegic):

(a) Astigmatism—not more than 1.00 diopter.

(b) Hyperopia—not more than 1.75 diopters in any meridian for individuals under age 35 and not more than 2.00 diopters in any meridian for individuals age 35 and over.

(c) Myopia—not more than 1.25 diopters in any meridian regardless of age.

c. Class 2. As prescribed in chapter 4, AR 40-501.

d. Class 2 (modified). As prescribed in chapter 7, AR 40-501 (to be published). This is the same as Class 2 except:

(1) A satisfactory Adaptability Rating for Military Aeronautics (ARMA), as indicated by notation in item 72, SF 88 (Report of Medical Examination) is required.

(2) Refractive error (cycloplegic):

(a) Astigmatism—not more than 1.00 diopter.

(b) Hyperopia—not more than 1.75 diopters in any meridian for individuals under age 35 and not more than 2.00 diopters in any meridian for individuals age 35 and over.

(c) Myopia— not more than 1.25 diopters in any meridian regardless of age.

3-4. Designation of applicable standards. Applicants' medical fitness for flight training will be evaluated as follows:

a. Applicants who have completed the AROTC Flight Training Program under the provisions of AR 145-1 and applicants who have been previously awarded a U.S. Military aeronautical rating as pilot or naval aviator will meet Class 2 medical fitness standards.

b. Applicants in the grades of colonel or lieutenant colonel (promotable) will meet Class 2 (modified) medical fitness standards.

c. Applicants possessing valid FAA private pilot or higher certificates, except those individuals covered by *a* and *b* above, will meet Class 1A (modified) medical fitness standards.

d. All other applicants will meet Class 1A medical fitness standards.

3-5. Administrative procedures. *a.* With the exception of Senior Officer Flight Training applicants, the medical examining facility, using the format in figure 3-1, will forward the completed report of medical examination for flight training, including SF 88, SF 89, SF 520, allied medical papers, and a statement concerning the individ-

ual's status as a current FAA rated pilot, directly to The Surgeon General, Department of the Army, ATTN: MEDPS-SP, Washington, DC 20314. Senior Officer Flight Training applicants will forward examinations in accordance with the appropriate DA message. After final determination of medical fitness for flying, the report will be forwarded by The Surgeon General to the Chief of Personnel Operations or Chief, National Guard Bureau, as appropriate, and designated on the covering letter.

e. If review of medical records and prior exami-

nation reports reveal an obvious medical disqualification, the local examining physician will so notify the applicant's commander. Further medical examination need not be accomplished unless the applicant has completed the AROTC Flight Training Program or is above the grade of captain. In these cases, the examination will be completed and forwarded using the format in figure 3-1. Format will be appropriately prepared and forwarded for all applicants with the inclosures deleted if applicants examination was not completed because of obvious disqualification.

CHAPTER 4

APPLICATION AND SELECTION PROCEDURES

4-1. Application procedures for warrant officers, lieutenants, and captains. *a.* Army officers on active duty, except as indicated in (5) and (7) below, may submit application to the Chief of Personnel Operations, ATTN: OPD- (basic branch of applicant), Department of the Army, Washington, DC 20315, through appropriate CONUS Army or major oversea command. For Medical Service Corps officers, address applications to The Surgeon General, ATTN: MEDPT-MS, Department of the Army, Washington, DC 20314. All applications will be forwarded through appropriate channels utilizing the format in figure 4-1. The first indorsement to application will include a statement concerning FAST-OB scores as prescribed in paragraph 2-3*a*. All applicants must be entered into an initial flight training class prior to completing 48 months active commissioned service, after which they are ineligible for entry under this paragraph. Subsequent applications must be submitted under the provisions of paragraph 4-2.

(1) Eligible officers assigned within the continental United States may submit applications at any time. Normally, officers alerted for or on oversea orders will not be accepted for flight training until completion of a short tour or at least one year in a long tour area.

(2) Eligible officers in oversea commands may submit applications at any time. If accepted for flight training, officers may be returned from overseas subsequent to completion of a minimum of 1 year oversea tour of duty, providing they can be entered into a class prior to completing 48 months active commissioned service.

(3) Prospective officer candidate school graduates may submit applications for flight training at any time prior to receipt of DA assignment instructions.

(4) Army National Guard or Army Reserve officers on active duty in an obligated status as defined in AR 135-215 will inclose with his application for flight training a request (DA Form 2496) for voluntary indefinite agreement.

(5) Reserve officers who have completed the AROTC Flight Training Program under the pro-

visions of AR 145-1 will be reported to Headquarters, Department of the Army by the appropriate Army commander when initial assignment instructions are requested. A copy of the obligatory service contract (DA Form 597-1) will be sent to the appropriate career branch in conjunction with the request for instructions. AROTC Flight Training Program graduates (except those officers designated as Distinguished Military Graduates who accept Regular Army commissions) will be ordered to the first aviation training course, after completion of their branch basic course, for which branch training quotas are available. These individuals must be entered into an initial flight training class within 6 months from date of entry on active duty, or be given the option of declining such training. In this case, they may apply (DA Form 2496) to voluntarily revert to a 2-year service obligation unless additional obligations have been incurred through other provisions.

(6) Regular Army officers may submit applications at any time; however, they must complete the appropriate service requirements set forth in paragraph 2-1*e* prior to entry in Army aviation flight training.

(7) United States Military Academy and Distinguished Military Graduates who accept appointments in the Regular Army in a branch of the Service authorized aviators may voluntarily elect Army aviation flight training prior to graduation and commissioning. This voluntary election of Army aviation flight training will constitute application for such training. Distinguished Military Graduates who participated in the AROTC Flight Training Program are considered as volunteers for the Army Aviation Program under this paragraph. Actual flight training will be programmed as soon as possible upon the officer's completion of applicable training and duty outlined in paragraph 2-1*e*. Regardless of the initial area assignment selected by these officers after completion of the required troop duty, they will be entered into the first aviation flight training course for which branch quotas are available. Medical qualifications must be established six months prior to

scheduled completion of the troop duty outlined in paragraph 2-1e. Completed medical examination forms must arrive at Headquarters, Department of the Army no later than 120 days prior to scheduled completion of troop duty. Failure to comply with this requirement will remove officer from consideration for Army aviation flight training on the basis of precommissioning volunteer statement. Subsequent applications for Army aviation flight training must be submitted under the provisions of (6) above. Commander of individual will notify the officer's career branch of the score attained on the FAST-OB test, except AROTC Flight Training Program graduates. Medical disqualification or failure to achieve the minimum score established for FAST-OB will preclude consideration of the individual for flight training.

b. Officers of the Army Reserve not on active duty, including those officers on active duty for training only, will submit application through channels to the Chief of Personnel Operations, ATTN: RCPA-P, Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indianapolis, IN 46249. Upon receipt of an application, the appropriate commander will immediately provide the name, grade, and social security account number of the applicant to the Chief of Personnel Operations, ATTN: RCPC P, to facilitate requesting the individual's records from the U.S. Army Administration Center, St. Louis, Missouri. Applications must be indorsed by the commander concerned. Indorsements will state whether a quota is available, if sufficient funds are available, and list special justification for this training including proposed TOE/TDA assignment of applicants upon completion of training. Upon notification of approval by Headquarters, Department of the Army, applications will be returned to the area commander for issuance of orders. See AR 135 200.

c. Army National Guard officers not on active duty will submit applications through channels to the Chief, National Guard Bureau, ATTN: NG-AROTS, Washington, DC 20310. National Guard funds will be used to defray expenses for National Guard officers undergoing flight training. Ad-

jutants general of the States will issue appropriate orders upon receiving notification of approval from the National Guard Bureau.

4-2. Application procedures for officers in grades above captain. a. Upon notification of senior officer flight training quotas, officers on active duty who meet the eligibility criteria set forth in paragraph 2-2 may apply for flight training by submitting to the Chief of Personnel Operations, ATTN: OPDAA or, for MSC officers, to The Surgeon General, ATTN: MEDPT-MS, Department of the Army, Washington, DC 20314 the following statement by postcard:

I volunteer for training in rotary wing aircraft. If selected and upon successful completion of such training, I understand that I will incur a three-year service obligation.

b. Forward, so as to arrive at Headquarters, Department of the Army not later than the cut-off date designated in message, a completed flight physical as appropriate.

c. Army National Guard officers not on active duty will submit applications in accordance with instructions issued by the Chief, National Guard Bureau.

d. Officers of the Army Reserve, not on active duty, may submit applications as outlined in paragraph 4-1, after approval by Chief, Army Reserve.

4-3. Selection procedures. The considerations involved in the selection and assignment of applicants for initial flight training are outlined below.

a. Qualified applicants for flight training will be ranked by selection authorities in descending order of qualification based on FAST-OB composite scores. Selections will be made consistent with these rankings, manner of performance as reflected in official records, and other requirements prescribed in this regulation. In addition, personal desires as to the type initial flight training will be considered when quotas are available in a branch for both fixed and rotary wing training.

b. Applications and statements of interest will remain active under competitive consideration until the officer is selected, withdraws his application, exceeds 48 months active commissioned service, or is notified of nonselection with reasons.

c. Aircraft engineering or mechanical experience.

d. Other aviation experience.

5. It is understood that, upon entry into flight training, I will incur the service obligation specified in DA Pamphlet 350-10 and paragraph 1-4, AR 611-110 and computed in accordance with AR 350-100, and that I will be obligated to serve in aviation assignments for a minimum of 3 years subsequent to completion of the training.

6. Remarks (requests for waivers and other explanatory materials).

1. Certification of civilian pilot rating and flying time or previous military flight training.

2. Request for extended active duty (DA Form 2496) (if applicable).

3. Request for transfer to branch authorized aviators (if applicable—not required for warrant officers).

4. DA Form 6256 (FAST-OB scoring worksheet).

CHAPTER 5

ADMINISTRATIVE PROCESSING FOLLOWING SELECTION

5-1. Assignment to flight training. *a.* An applicant selected to attend Army aviation flight training will be notified by special orders assigning him to a course. Those not selected will be informed with the return of their applications.

b. Active duty officers selected for Army aviation flight training will be ordered to the appropriate aviation training facility or facilities in a TDY status in conjunction with a PCS movement. Army National Guard and Army Reserve officers not on active duty or on active duty for training who are selected for this training will be attached in an active duty training status to the appropriate U.S. Army aviation training facility. They will be ordered to active duty for training for a period necessary to accomplish directed training and travel incident thereto.

c. The Chief, National Guard Bureau is responsible for selection and assignment of Army National Guard applicants for Army aviation flight training.

5-2. Records. An officer ordered to Army aviation flight training will deliver the following records to the commandant of the appropriate training facility:

a. Twenty-five copies of orders assigning the officer to the course.

b. Current Standard Form 88 (2 copies), Standard Form 89, and Standard Form 520.

c. DA Form 66 (Officer Qualification Record).

d. DD Form 722 (Health Record) and DD Form 722-1 (Health Record-Dental) with appropriate inclosures.

e. PHS 731 (International Certificate of Vaccination).

f. Pay records.

g. DA Form 201 (Military Personnel Records Jacket U.S. Army).

5-3. Relief of students and assignment of graduates. *a.* Active Army officers who are eliminated from flight training will be reported by message to the Chief of Personnel Operations, ATTN: (career branch), or, for MSC officers, to The Surgeon General, ATTN: MEDPT-MS, Department of

Army, Washington, DC with a request for immediate reassignment instructions. Message will include—

(1) Name, grade, branch, SSAN.

(2) Reason for and date of elimination.

(3) Assignment preferences.

(4) Days delay enroute desired.

b. Officers of the Army National Guard and Army Reserve participating in an active duty for training status who are eliminated from flight training will be released from active duty and returned to their home station. A message report of elimination from flight training will be forwarded to the appropriate Reserve component unit commander. Additionally, an information copy will be forwarded to Chief, National Guard Bureau, ATTN: NG-AROTS, for NG officers, or Chief, Army Reserve, ATTN: OCAR-O&T, Washington, DC 20310, and Chief of Personnel Operations, ATTN: RCPA-P, Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indianapolis, IN 46249, for USAR officers, as appropriate. The report will include the date of departure of the individual for his home station.

c. Active Army officers attending Army aviation flight training in TDY status who successfully complete the course will report to assigned units for utilization.

d. Headquarters, Department of the Army will publish reassignment orders as necessary for those active Army officers whose elimination from the flight training course precludes their proper utilization or assignment to the PCS station to which they are assigned.

e. Upon completion of each rotary wing and fixed wing training class at any flight training center, the installation will forward to the U.S. Army Behavioral Science Research Laboratory, ATTN: CRDBSRL-DR3, Room 239, The Commonwealth Building, 1320 Wilson Boulevard, Arlington, VA 22209, the following information which may be in roster form:

(1) Title of course.

(2) Starting date of course or training phase.

(3) Name, grade or rank, and social security account number of each class member with an indication of—

(a) Withdrawal or elimination—give reasons.

(b) Turn back—give new class number.

(c) Pass—give course grade.

(d) Other—describe any action which would change anticipated date of completion of training.
