## The U.S. Army Regimental System

This UPDATE printing publishes a new regulation that is effective 22 August 1986.

**Summary.** This regulation provides the policies and guidance for management of the U.S. Army Regimental System. It includes combat arms, combat support, combat service support, and special branch elements.

**Applicability.** This regulation applies to the Active Army. It does not apply to the Army National Guard; however, plans for implementation in the U.S. Army Reserve are under development and will be incorporated in future update issues.

**Impact on New Manning System.** This is a New Manning System regulation which affects a subset of that system.

**Internal control systems.** This regulation is not subject to the requirement of AR

11-2. It does not contain internal control provisions.

**Supplementation.** Supplementation of this regulation and establishment of forms other than DA forms are prohibited without prior approval from HQDA (DAPE-MPU), WASH DC 20310-0300.

**Interim changes.** Interim changes to this regulation are not official unless they are authenticated by The Adjutant General. Users will destroy interim changes on their expiration dates unless sooner superseded or rescinded.

**Suggested improvements.** The proponent for this regulation is the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel. Users are invited to send comments and suggested improvements on DA Form 2028 (Recommended

Changes to Publications and Blank Forms) directly to HQDA (DAPE-MPU), WASH DC 20310-0300.

**Distribution.** Distribution of this issue has been made in accordance with DA Form 12-9A-R requirements for 600 series publications. The number of copies distributed to a given subscriber is the number of copies requested in Blocks 383 and 385 of the subscriber's DA Form 12-9A-R. AR 600-82 distribution is B for Active Army, D for ARNG, and D for USAR. ## Chapter 1 Introduction

### 1-1. Purpose

This regulation provides an overview of the development of the U.S. Army Regimental System (USARS) and disseminates Army policy guidance applicable to soldiers managed under this system. Policy changes contained in this regulation are directive in nature and will be incorporated in the appropriate Army regulations and pamphlets.

### 1-2. References

Required and related publications are listed in appendix A.

### 1-3. Explanations of abbreviations and terms

Abbreviations and special terms used in this regulation are explained in the glossary.

### 1-4. Responsibilities

*a. Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel (DCSPER).* The DCSPER will—

(1) Develop, define, and articulate the overall USARS concept.

(2) Plan and coordinate the overall methodology and approach for transition of the Army to the USARS.

(3) Develop the Regimental structure of combat arms units for the USARS.

(4) Provide guidance for the development and inclusion of the combat support/combat service support (CS/CSS)/special branches into the USARS.

(5) Determine the implementation schedules for the combat arms, CS/CSS, and special branches.

(6) Keep the Army informed of the continuing developments and changes to the USARS.

(7) Direct the overall conduct of a field evaluation to determine the manageability and acceptability of the USARS.

(8) Direct analytic efforts to determine the sustainability of the USARS.

(9) Ensure full integration of USARS with the Army of Excellence structure.

(10) Act as a catalyst to initiate actions and resolve implementation issues.

(11) Serve as a clearing house for approval of all USARS policy changes to ensure consistency and compatibility with the development and implementation of the overall concept.

(12) Ensure formulation, management, and evaluation of manpower and personnel policies, plans, and programs necessary to implement the USARS.

(13) Issue instructions on the proper wear of distinctive heraldic items and accouterments on the uniform for the USARS.

*b. Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and Plans (DCSOPS).* The DCSOPS will—

(1) Serve as the proponent agency for all force structure requirements that will generate to the USARS.

(2) Provide policies for the accountability and turnover of historical and organizational properties except colors and streamers.

(3) Provide historical support for updating the Chief of Staff, U.S. Army (CSA) approved Order of Merit List (OML) for the USARS.

(4) Determine the lineage and honors for USARS units.

(5) Provide advice and support in all matters pertaining to USARS and organizational history.

*c. Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics (DCSLOG).* The DCSLOG will—

(1) Develop policy guidance for and coordinate the supply and distribution of Regimental insignia (crest) for affiliated soldiers.

(2) Coordinate the supply and distribution of distinctive heraldic items (accouterments) for wear on uniforms.

(3) Develop logistical policy guidance for Regimental implementation and monitor compliance.

*d. Comptroller of the Army (COA).* The COA will—

(1) Provide policy guidance for funding of USARS initiatives.

(2) Provide support to Army Staff agencies for the development of cost analysis associated with USARS initiatives.

*e. The Judge Advocate General (TJAG).* The TJAG will—

(1) Examine legal ramifications of USARS changes.

(2) Assess the impact of the USARS on the Judge Advocate General's Corps Officers.

*f. Chief of Public Affairs (CPA).* The CPA will—

(1) Develop and disseminate public affairs plan and guidance in support of the USARS.

(2) Coordinate the release of USARS information to internal and external publics, as appropriate.

*g. Chief of Legislative Liaison (CLL).* The CLL will—

(1) Keep Congress (House and Senate Armed Services Committees) informed on USARS development and implementation.

(2) Evaluate relevant congressional testimony pertaining to congressional views and implications applicable to USARS.

(3) Assist in the development of legislation to support USARS initiatives.

*h. The Adjutant General (TAG).* TAG will—

(1) Coordinate the supply of organizational colors, streamers, and guidons for the USAR units.

(2) Develop and approve the design of heraldic items for Regiments/Corps/special branches.

(3) Provide commanders with authorized sources for procurement of distinctive heraldic items (accouterments) for wear on uniforms.

*i. Assistant Chief of Staff for Information Management (ACSIM).* The ACSIM will publish and distribute Department of the Army (DA) General Orders announcing unit activations and inactivations for the USARS.

*j. Commanding General US. Army Training and Doctrine Command (CG, TRADOC).* CG, TRADOC will—

(1) Conduct a field evaluation, in coordination with the DCSPER (NMSD), to assess the impacts, manageability, and soldier acceptability of the USARS. The Commander will also provide Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel (ODCSPER) with recommendations for policy changes which are required to facilitate the transition to Army-wide implementation of the USARS.

(2) Maintain, plan, and coordinate the inclusion of the training base, Aviation, Corps of Engineers, and CS/CSS branches into the USARS.

(3) Include USARS in New Manning System information dissemination efforts.

*k. Commanders of major Army commands (MACOMs).* Commanders will—

(1) Implement USARS as developed by Headquarters, Department of the Army (HQDA).

(2) Plan, budget, and program necessary support of USARS.

(3) Develop and implement public affairs information plan to provide USARS information to its soldiers and subordinate commands.

*l. Commanding General, U.S. Army Military Personnel Center (CG, MILPERCEN).* The CG, MILPERCEN will—

(1) Affiliate all soldiers with Regiments or Corps into the USARS.

(2) Publish affiliation procedures.

(3) Integrate Regimental affiliation or association into the active Army personnel assignment system. Affiliation and association of soldiers will be primary assignment considerations. This will be accomplished and soldiers managed through the automated assignment system, distribution and assignment officers, and pertinent regulations.

(4) Maintain data as to the number and percentage of soldiers who are assigned to their Regiment of choice, the relative fill of each Regiment, and any other statistical data necessary to manage soldiers in the USARS.

(5) Implement and manage the Regimental Adjutant Program.

(6) Manage the Honorary Regimental/Corps positions.

## Chapter 2 U.S. Army Regimental System

### 2-1. General

The Chief of Staff, Army, approved the USARS concept in 1981 to provide each soldier with continuous identification with a single Regiment and to support that concept with a personnel system that would increase a soldier's probability of serving recurring assignments with his or her Regiment. During Phase I (Jan 82 to Aug 84), 15 Regiments were implemented and approximately 25,000 soldiers were affiliated. Since that

time, the USARS has evolved into a system that will encompass the total Army.

## 2-2. Mission

The mission is to enhance combat effectiveness through a framework that provides the opportunity for affiliation, develops loyalty and commitment, fosters an extended sense of belonging, improves unit esprit, and institutionalizes the war fighting ethos.

## 2-3. Concept

The concept of the USARS—

a. Includes the total Army as reflected below.

(1) Active Army.

(a) All combat arms battalions.

(b) Separate companies/batteries/troops.

(c) All combat support/combat service support/special branches.

(d) Appropriate training base battalions.

(2) Reserve Components.

(a) Army National Guard. (See NGB Regulation 600-82.)

(b) U.S. Army Reserve. (To be added.)

b. Offers the opportunity for long-term identification with a Regiment/Corps.

c. Provides the potential for recurring assignments within a Regiment/Corps.

d. Provides the opportunity to further emphasize the history, customs, and traditions of the Regiment/Corps.

e. Provides Regiments that are structured as one of the following:

(1) One or more like-type continental United States (CONUS) units linked with one or more like-type outside continental United States (OCONUS) units.

(2) One or more like-type units located exclusively in either CONUS or OCONUS.

(3) One or more training battalions (Ranger companies).

(4) Tactical Armored Cavalry or Ranger Regiments.

f. Provides for combat support/combat service support/special branches to operate on a "whole branch" concept as a Corps, but within the Corps, or special branch, carrying on the activities and traditions of a Regiment. (See chap 4.)

g. Offers Regimental affiliation to our soldiers to allow the continuous association or identification with a combat arms Regiment/CS/CSS Corps or special branch throughout their careers. Regimental affiliation will provide different opportunities for soldiers depending upon which combat arms Regiment he or she chooses to be affiliated with or whether he or she affiliates with a CS/CSS Corps or special branch. Each affiliation or association process and its impacts will be discussed in subsequent chapters. Additional features of the Regimental affiliation process are as follows:

(1) Allows a combat arms soldier to select the Regiment of his or her choice in accordance with procedures outlined in DA Pamphlet 600-8. Soldiers can change their affiliation at any time.

(2) Provides that combat support/combat service support soldiers will automatically be affiliated with their Corps/special branch.

(3) Specifies that all soldiers will belong to a Regiment/Corps. (See chap 3 for exceptions.)

(4) Permits no limit to the number of soldiers who can be affiliated with a Regiment/Corps.

(5) Provides that CS/CSS soldiers can associate with combat arms Regiments. A soldier can change his or her association at any time.

## 2-4. Implementation methodology

a. All combat arms soldiers will be affiliated with a Regiment of their choice by the end of fiscal year (FY) 1986. All Regiments will be available for selection regardless of the implementation schedule. (See chap 3 for exceptions.)

b. All combat arms Regiments will be implemented based upon a phased schedule. Complete implementation is expected by FY 1992.

c. The goal for CS/CSS/special branch Corps is for their plans to be implemented by the end of FY 1986.

## Chapter 3 Combat Arms

### 3-1. Concept

a. The combat arms will include Air Defense Artillery, Armor, Aviation, Cavalry, Corps of Engineers, Field Artillery, and Infantry Regiments.

b. Combat arms soldiers may affiliate with any of the combat arms Regiments, consistent with their primary military occupational specialty (PMOS) or specialty code and special qualifications identifiers/additional skill identifier (SQI/ASI).

c. It should be noted that a soldier will have a greater opportunity to serve recurring assignments in his or her Regiment and thus have greater predictability if a Regiment is chosen that has battalions in both CONUS and OCONUS locations.

d. Since there is no ceiling on the number of soldiers who can affiliate with a particular Regiment, recurring assignments to Regiments where the number of affiliated soldiers exceeds the requirements are diminished.

e. All soldiers upon obtaining career status or officers upon attendance at the officer advanced course (OAC) must affiliate with a Regiment.

### 3-2. Affiliation policy

a. Appendix B lists all USARS Regiments, including their CONUS/OCONUS locations, being offered to combat arms soldiers for affiliation.

(1) All eligible enlisted careerists, warrant officers, and officers (captain and above) are required to affiliate with a Regiment. However, they will be permitted to

affiliate with a Regiment of their choice of their branch, regardless of the Regimental implementation schedule. There will be no limit on the number of soldiers who can affiliate with a given Regiment, and soldiers may change their affiliation at any time. Soldiers are limited, however, to affiliate with Regiments based on their PMOS, ASI, or SQI. For example, a soldier with a PMOS of 11B20 could only be affiliated with mechanized, light infantry, or training base Regiment. He could not affiliate with an Armor Regiment, nor an Airborne, Ranger, or Special Forces Regiment.

(2) Lieutenants will be allowed to voluntarily affiliate with any of the Regiments within their branch or delay their affiliation until attendance at OAC. Once affiliated, they may change their Regimental affiliation at any time. Prior to the start of OAC, a packet will be mailed to each OAC attendee by his or her respective branch. In this packet will be a form for the officer to indicate his or her Regimental affiliation preference which must be completed and returned to the respective branch. Thus, the officer's Regimental affiliation will become an assignment consideration for his or her follow-on assignment after OAC.

(3) First-term soldiers will be allowed to voluntarily affiliate with any of the Regiments within their branch or may elect to delay affiliation until reenlistment. Once affiliated, they may change their Regimental affiliation at any time. (See AR 601-280.)

(4) Regimental affiliation will be a primary assignment consideration for field grade officers and enlisted soldiers once their affiliated Regiments are implemented. No assignment guarantees will be made, as Army requirements and soldier professional development needs must be met; however, it is incumbent upon commanders and the personnel community to make every effort to ensure that requisitions are submitted for and filled by affiliated Regimental soldiers and that soldiers are subsequently assigned within their Regiments (AR 614-100 and AR 614-200). To do less, we are not delivering on the implied soldier expectations of enjoying recurring assignments within a Regiment and the opportunity for long-term identification with a distinguished Regiment.

b. Command sergeants major (CSMs), sergeants major (SGMs), and colonels (COLs) (to include master sergeant/first sergeant and lieutenant colonel promotables) were affiliated on a one-time basis by direct mail from MILPERCEN. (This procedure will not be repeated as this was a start-up procedure.)

c. All combat arms officers, captain and above, who are graduates of the officer advanced course, and career enlisted soldiers will be affiliated by the end of FY 1986.

d. Specific procedures for affiliation will be published in a future update of DA Pamphlet 600-8. These procedures will permit affiliation and change of affiliation to be administered at the local military personnel office (MILPO) level.

### 3-3. Cross-leveling policy

a. Regimental affiliation is a commitment to the individual soldier. When an installation assigns an affiliated soldier to battalion level, every effort must be made to assign him or her to a battalion within his or her Regiment. In general, assignments should be made in the following order of priority: battalion of the Regiment, table or organization and equipment (TOE) level above the battalion, or an additional Regimental assignment (ARA) at the installation level.

b. The management of affiliated soldiers must be conducted at all levels of command, from MILPERCEN down to and including the Regimental level of detail. In order for the system to function properly, a "one-for-one" exchange is required; that is an OCONUS 16th Infantry soldier is replaced with a CONUS 16th Infantry soldier.

c. Local commanders and MILPERCEN may involuntarily cross-level units with soldiers who are affiliated in order to meet unit readiness. Soldiers may be asked to volunteer before involuntary cross-leveling is accomplished. Affiliated soldiers who are involuntarily cross-leveled to other Regiments have the option to change or retain their affiliation.

## Chapter 4 Combat Support/Combat Service Support/Special Branch

### 4-1. Concept

The primary thrust of the CS/CSS/Special Branch Regimental Plan is to fully integrate the CS/CSS/special branches into the USARS. All branches will retain their "Corps" titles and implement as "whole branches." However, it is the responsibility of all proponents to incorporate within their Corps the intent and spirit of the Regimental System which is to provide for soldier opportunity and professional development, and for affiliation/association which is meaningful to the soldier.

### 4-2. Branches within the CS/CSS/Special Branch Regimental System

- a. Adjutant General's Corps.
- b. Chaplain's Corps.
- c. Chemical Corps.
- d. Corps of Engineers. (Combat arms branch, adopting the "whole branch" Corps concept.)
- e. Finance Corps.
- f. Judge Advocate General's Corps.
- g. Army Medical Department.
- h. Military Intelligence Corps.
- i. Military Police Corps.
- j. Ordnance Corps.
- k. Quartermaster Corps.
- l. Signal Corps.
- m. Transportation Corps.

### 4-3. Corps plans for the Regimental System

- Plans for the Regimental system include—
- a. The location of a Corps home.

b. The Reserve Components.

c. Corps accouterments. (See chap 5.)

d. Corps colors. (See chap 5.)

e. Corps Marketing Plan to educate soldiers about the Regimental System and to keep soldiers informed of Corps activities/events/historical significance of the Corps.

f. Honorary positions. (See chap 5.)

g. Plan for providing CS/CSS/special branch/engineer soldiers the potential to serve recurring assignments based upon geographical locations, regional basing, branch units, or association with combat arms units.

h. Training base plan to provide Regimental colors to training units.

### 4-4. Affiliation policy

a. All CS/CSS special branch/engineer officers and enlisted soldiers will become automatically affiliated with their Corps/special branch upon graduation from branch/MOS producing schools.

b. CS/CSS/special branch/engineer officers and enlisted soldiers may not change their affiliation unless they change their branch/MOS which removes them from the Corps/special branch of affiliation.

c. CS/CSS/special branch/engineer officers and enlisted soldier, with the exceptions of General Officers, COLs, SGMs and CSMs, cannot affiliate with a combat arms Regiment even if they have previously served in those Regiments in a combat arms branch/MOS. CS/CSS/special branch/engineer soldiers who have an additional specialty of Special Forces or MOS 18 while being managed by CS/CSS/special branches/engineer may affiliate with the 1st Special Forces.

d. It is the responsibility of each Corps/special branch to develop a personnel assignment system for its soldiers that will allow for stability and predictability of assignments within their Corps/special branch. Additionally, where feasible, it is their responsibility to develop a personnel procedure to permit CS/CSS/special branch/engineer soldiers to associate and serve on a recurring basis with combat arms Regiments. This will be an evolutionary process but it is the key in developing a Corps/special branch that meets the spirit and intent of the Regimental System. This system will be affected by mission and career development requirements for special branch personnel.

### 4-5. Implementation

a. All CS/CSS/special branch/engineer plans have been approved by the chief of Staff, Army.

b. The DCSPER published implementing directives subsequent to CSA approval of CS/CSS/special branch/engineer plans.

c. As a goal, all CS/CSS/special branch/engineer plans will be implemented in FY 1986.

## Chapter 5 Regimental/Corps Enhancements

### 5-1. Concept

The concept and structure of the USARS serve as a backdrop for the formulation of other principles and symbols of heraldry which contribute to a soldier's identification with his or her Regiment/Corps.

### 5-2. Regimental/Corps adjutants

a. MILPERCEN nominates, and the DCSPER appoints, adjutants for each combat arms Regiment that is paired and linked (nonpaired as appropriate) and is implemented in the USARS. They are combat arms officers assigned to MILPERCEN and should be of a branch appropriate to the Regiment, with preference given to previous service in Regimental battalions. The Regimental adjutant's primary duties are as follows:

- (1) Monitor Regimental strength.
  - (2) Play an active role in the affiliation process.
  - (3) Maintain liaison with Regimental battalions.
  - (4) Assist in special actions.
  - (5) Make CONUS/OCONUS visits to each battalion/squadron of the Regiment annually.
  - (6) Monitor the Honorary Colonel of the Regiment, Honorary Sergeant Major of the Regiment, and Distinguished Members of the Regiment program within their Regiments.
  - (7) Support and assist in executing the Corps Marketing Plan.
- b. Corps adjutants for CS/CSS/special branches/engineers will be appointed by the branch proponents and approved by the Chief of the Corps (para 5-3 b (1)). Duties and responsibilities of the adjutant will be defined by each branch proponent and approved by the Chief of the Corps.

### 5-3. Honorary positions

a. HQDA has approved the appointment of the Honorary Colonel, Honorary Sergeant Major, and Distinguished Members of the Regiment/Corps to provide a link with history for today's soldiers. The primary mission of these special appointees is to perpetuate the history and traditions of the Regiment/Corps, thereby enhancing unit morale and esprit.

(1) Honorary Colonel of the Regiment/Corps (HCOR)/(HCOC).

(a) The HCOR/HCOC is a distinguished retired commissioned officer in the rank of colonel or above, with former service in a unit of the Regiment/Corps, or in the chain of command above Regiment who is appointed for a 3-year renewable term that may be terminated earlier by either MACOM/installation commander or incumbent, following 30 days advance notice.

(b) Each Regiment/Corps will have an HCOR/HCOC but only one HCOR/HCOC will serve in the Regiment/Corps at any given time. The HCOR/HCOC oversees other honorary position programs and

their maintenance. The HCOR/HCOC may also act as a liaison between his or her Regiment/Corps and a Regimental/Corps association (private organization), if one exists.

(c) The duties of a HCOR/HCOC within the Regiment/Corps are ceremonial and do not conflict with the chain of command. Attendance at Regimental/Corps functions is by invitation, and participation is encouraged.

(d) The position of HCOR/HCOC offers to the Regiment/Corps the prestige, stature, and experience of the individual appointed. The HCOR/HCOC assists in fostering Regimental/Corps esprit, traditions, and perpetuation of the history of the Regiment/Corps.

(2) *Honorary Sergeant Major of the Regiment/Corps (HSGMOR/HSGMOC).*

(a) The HSGMOR/HSGMOC is a distinguished retired noncommissioned officer in the rank of sergeant first class (SFC) or above, with prior service in a unit of the Regiment/Corps, or in the chain of command above regiment who is appointed for a 3-year renewable term which may be terminated earlier by either MACOM/installation commander or incumbent, following 30 days advance notice. When appointed, the HSGMOR/HSGMOC will assist the HCOR/HCOC in perpetuating the history and traditions of the Regiment/Corps, especially among the enlisted soldiers.

(b) Each Regiment/Corps will have an HSGMOR/HSGMOC, but only one HSGMOR/HSGMOC will serve in the Regiment/Corps at any one time.

(c) The duties of the HSGMOR/HSGMOC are ceremonial and do not conflict with the chain of command. Attendance at Regimental/Corps functions is by invitation, and participation is encouraged.

(3) *Distinguished Members of the Regiment/Corps (DMOR/DMOC)/(DMOC).*

(a) DMOR/DMOC are individuals of the same distinguished stature as the HCOR/HCOC and HSGMOR/HSGMOC, but may include active duty or retired officers, warrant officers, enlisted personnel, and civilians (nonretirees).

(b) Examples of DMOR/DMOC would be a prior enlisted member of the Regiment/Corps, recognized for his or her active duty accomplishments, or a distinguished member of the civilian community with former service in the Regiment/Corps. All DMOR/DMOC must have served in the Regiment/Corps.

(c) DMOR/DMOC are appointed to supplement and assist the efforts of the HCOR/HCOC and the HSGMOR/HSGMOC. Their tenure is indefinite. Unlike the solitary appointment of HCOR/HCOC and HSGMOR/HSGMOC, there are no limitations on the number of personnel who may be appointed as DMOR/DMOC.

(d) The duties of DMOR/DMOC are ceremonial and do not conflict with the

chain of command. Attendance at Regimental/Corps functions is by invitation, and participation is encouraged.

(e) The position of DMOR/DMOC offers the prestige, stature, and experience of the individuals appointed.

(4) *Nomination, selection, and appointment to Honorary/distinguished positions.*

(a) The responsibilities for nomination of individuals for the HCOR/HCOC, HSGMOR/HSGMOC, and DMOR/DMOC rest with all battalions of the Regiment and the Chiefs of the Corps.

(b) The responsibility to consolidate nominations and make recommendations rests with the commander of the lowest numbered CONUS based battalion of the Regiment (combat arms) and the Chiefs of the Corps (CS/CSS/special branches/engineers). For OCONUS Regiments without a CONUS homebase, these functions will be the responsibility of the lowest numbered OCONUS unit.

(c) The ultimate decision for selection and responsibility for appointment of an individual to serve as an HCOR/HCOC, HSGMOR/HSGMOC, or DMOR/DMOC rests with the installation commander for combat arms Regiments or the Chief of the Corps for CS/CSS/special branch/engineer Corps.

(d) Nominees will be selected based on input from the nominating battalions, squadrons, companies, batteries, troops, and the Corps.

(e) Appointments will only be made for individuals nominated by battalions and squadrons of the Regiment or the Corps. The installation commander or Chief of the Corps confirms the appointment by signing an appropriate certificate.

(f) Certificates are available from Commander, USAMILPERCEN, DAPC-EP-SR, 200 Stovall St., ALEX VA 22332-0400.

(5) *Honorary/distinguished position activities.* The activities of HCOR/HCOC, HSGMOR/HSGMOC, and DMOR/DMOC are limited to those ceremonial functions designed to promote and enhance the history and traditions of the Regiment/Corps, promote the war fighting ethos among soldiers, and create cohesion among members of the Regiment/Corps. Examples of activities are as follows:

(a) Attending command ceremonies.

(b) Participating in award ceremonies.

(c) Speaking on Regimental/Corps history and traditions at dinings-in, or other similar functions.

(d) Maintaining contact between CONUS and OCONUS battalions/elements of the Regiment.

(e) Assisting in historical professional development programs for officers and noncommissioned officers (NCOs).

b. Other positions that can be established by the Regiment/Corps but their appointments/activities are not dictated by HQDA policy are as follows:

(1) *Chief of the Corps.* The Chief of the branch proponent is usually the Chief of the

Corps. However, the individuals who occupy the following positions are the Chiefs of their respective Corps:

(a) Chief of Chaplains.

(b) The Surgeon General.

(c) The Judge Advocate General.

(d) Chief of Engineers.

(e) Quartermaster General.

(2) *SGM of the Corps.* The CSM of the branch proponent is usually the SGM of the Corps.

#### **5-4. Honorary/distinguished position funding/support**

a. Travel and attendance to CONUS Regimental/Corps functions for HCOR/HCOC, HSGMOR/HSGMOC, and DMOR/DMOC are to be accomplished by invitational travel orders, funded by the installation or activity requesting their presence.

b. In the event of oversea travel, funding is provided by the OCONUS command/activity requesting the presence of the HCOR/HCOC, HSGMOR/HSGMOC, or DMOR/DMOC.

c. Reimbursement of incidental costs; that is, telephone bills, publication costs, supplies, and other administrative costs associated with the duties of the HCOR/HCOC and HSGMOR/HSGMOC, are not authorized. Legislation to pay incidental costs for these activities is pending.

d. Regimental/Corps associations may be established to support the honorary positions. (See AR 1-210 for guidelines.)

#### **5-5. Regimental headquarters, dining facilities, museums**

a. It is not the intent of HQDA to change the tactical organizations of the brigades, battalions, squadrons, or Armored Cavalry and Ranger Regiments. Regiments (with the exception of Armored Cavalry and Ranger Regiments) are nontactical organizations intended to perpetuate the history and traditions of Regiments for soldiers.

b. To clearly delineate the distinction between tactical and nontactical organizations, it is intended that a brigade headquarters and headquarters company (HHC) of a combat brigade not be identified with any Regiment, even if all battalions of the brigade share the same Regimental designation (exception: Armored Cavalry and Ranger Regiments). Regimental responsibilities rest with the battalion commander of the lowest numbered CONUS battalion not the brigade commander.

c. The physical creation of Regimental headquarters, dining facilities, and museums is not authorized. However, if those Regimental facilities are created from existing facilities, care must be taken to avoid confusion within the tactical organizational structure.

#### **5-6. Regimental/Corps accouterments**

a. *Regimental/Corps affiliation.* Regimental/Corps affiliation is further enhanced

by Regimental/Corps accouterments for permanent wear with the uniform. (See AR 670-1.)

*b. Wear of Regimental/Corps distinctive unit insignia.* The wear of the Regimental/Corps distinctive unit insignia (crest) on the Army green, blue, and white uniform is a visible sign of commitment to a Regiment/Corps. The Regimental/Corps distinctive unit insignia (crest) will be worn in accordance with AR 670-1 as a means of further enhancing the Regimental System.

*c. Distinctive unit insignia (DUI) development.*

(1) The DUI will be designed by The Institute of Heraldry for the combat arms, combat support, combat service support, and special branches in conjunction with the branch proponents.

(2) No Regimental/Corps crest will be authorized for wear without the approval of The Institute of Heraldry.

(3) Once development of the DUI has been completed by The Institute of Heraldry, a drawing of the DUI, a list of certified manufacturers, and a fact sheet containing complete procurement instructions will be sent to the branch proponents for use in procurement of the insignia.

*d. DUI distribution.* Any soldier can affiliate with any Regiment of his or her branch regardless of when the Regiment is scheduled for implementation under USARS. The fact that a soldier can affiliate with any Regiment without being presently assigned to that Regiment requires special DUI distribution procedures. Those procedures are being developed by Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics (ODCSLOG) and will be provided in an update of AR 700-84.

*e. Regimental/Corps belt buckles.* Regimental/Corps belt buckles are currently being considered. Procedures for the development of a belt buckle for each Regiment/Corps will be provided separately upon approval and will be included in an update of this regulation.

*f. Regimental collar insignia.* Regimental collar insignia will be worn as prescribed in AR 670-1.

*g. Regimental branch insignia.* The insignia will—

(1) Be issued by the unit commander for personnel assigned to Regimental units.

(2) Indicate the numerical designation of the Regiment. Battalion designation will not be indicated.

## Section II Terms

**Additional Regimental assignment**  
Any assignment outside of the battalions, squadrons, companies, batteries, and troops of a soldier's affiliated combat arms Regiment.

**Affiliation**  
The close and continuous identification of a soldier with a Regiment or a Corps.

**Association**  
The identification of a soldier with a geographical area, branch unit, or combat arms Regiment for the purposes of receiving recurring assignments based upon the soldier's choice. Association is a CS/CSS/special branch/engineer feature. All CS/CSS/special branches/engineers are affiliated with their Corps.

**Cross-leveling**  
The assignment policy which involuntarily assigns affiliated soldiers to units other than their Regiment.

**Distinguished Members of the Regiment/Corps**  
Distinguished members of the Regiment/Corps who are appointed to supplement the ceremonial duties of the Honorary Colonel of the Regiment/Corps. Persons appointed may be active duty or retired officers, warrant officers, enlisted personnel, and civilians (nonretirees) who served on active duty in the Regiment. DMOR/DMOC are not numerically limited and individuals may serve simultaneously. The tenures of DMOR/DMOC are indefinite.

**Ethos**  
The distinguishing character, sentiment, moral nature, or guiding belief of a soldier, his or her unit, or the Army.

**Honorary Colonel of the Regiment/Corps**  
A distinguished retired officer in the rank of colonel or above who has been appointed for a 3-year term to perpetuate the history and traditions of the Regiment. Only one HCOR/HCOC will serve in the Regiment at any one time. The duties of the incumbent are purely ceremonial and do not conflict with the chain of command.

**Honorary Sergeant Major of the Regiment/Corps**  
A distinguished retired noncommissioned officer in the rank of SFC or above, with prior service in a unit of the Regiment, who is appointed for a 3-year term. When appointed, the HSGMOR/HSGMOC will act

as an advisor to the HCOR/HCOC and supplement his or her activities in matters relating to the enlisted members of the Regiment. The duties are purely ceremonial and do not conflict with the chain of command.

#### **Regiment**

A single or a group of like-type combat arms/training units authorized a Regimental color. Regiments provide an affiliated soldier with an opportunity for long-term identification, the potential for recurring assignments, and the basis to perpetuate history, customs, and traditions.

#### **Regimental adjutant**

An active duty officer assigned to MILPERCEN who is the primary MILPERCEN point of contact for a combat arms paired and linked Regiment (nonpaired as appropriate). For Corps as designated by the Chief of the Corps.

#### **Regimental assests**

Any combat arms soldier affiliated by a management procedure to a specific numerically designated Regiment. A soldier does not have to be serving with, be on orders to, or have previously served with a unit in the Regiment before becoming a Regimental asset through affiliation.

#### **Regimental headquarters**

The designated location of the Regimental color. The location of a Regimental headquarters will be determined by DA. Normally, the headquarters will be collocated with that of the lowest numbered CONUS element. Exception: Single battalion Regiments located OCONUS.

#### **Regimental home base**


The installation at which one or more of the CONUS-based battalions of a Regimental are stationed. (Two Regiments have their home base in Hawaii.) The home of the Regimental color and memorabilia.

#### **Regimental home base commander**


Commander of the separate TOE organization at the installation to which the CONUS-based battalion of the Regiment is organic (usually the division but also includes separate brigades).

#### **Regimental linkage**


The process of aligning an OCONUS combat arms battalion with one or more CONUS combat arms battalions by similar TOE.



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
