b. The following titles, codes, and specifications for military occupational specialties are added in numerical sequence to section III:

X TRANSPORTATION STAFF OFFICER
(0692)

Advises commander and staff on transportation matters. Prepares plans for and supervises use of Transportation Corps units and facilities; prepares policies and supervises movement of troops and material; coordinates with other staff officers

and executes movement priorities as established by higher authority; coordinates the preparation of highway, rail, water, and air movement control plans, primary and supplemental traffic circulating plans, schedules, and subsequent movement control of water, rail, highway, air, and inland waterways transportation applicable to his unit or area; arranges for the procurement, storage and distribution of transportation equipment and supplies; determines capabilities and coordinates employment of available rail, highway, water, and air transport facilities; conducts inspection of all types of transportation equipment; compiles information on enemy transportation equipment and routes; advises commander and staff on availability of civilian or native labor to support transportation activities; supervises training of and may command Transportation Corps troops organically assigned or attached to unit.

Military experience essential. Must have experience as commander of a Transportation Corps unit and must be familiar with Army transportation and facilities. Should be graduate of Command and General Staff College and/or Transportation Corps School.

Civilian experience in the field of transportation desirable and should have a familiarity with commercial transportation procedures.

X JET FIGHTER PILOT (1059)

Flies jet powered aircraft on training, strafing, bombing, rocket-firing, patrol, or escort missions. Prior to take-off, plans flight in accordance with briefing instructions and weather forecast; checks condition of personal flying equipment and of the aircraft; flies various formations with other jet aircraft; uses radio and navigational aids on night and day operations and under various weather conditions.

Must be proficient in the performance of maneuvers and procedures peculiar to jet fighter aircraft and jet tactics employed in air to air fighting.

Must be proficient in aerial gunnery, rocket firing, and bombing. Must be able to withstand physical strains resulting from rapid acceleration and from rapid changes in temperature and pressure due to rapid changes in altitude. Must be a rated pilot and must have completed the prescribed training for jet type fighter aircraft as prescribed by the AF.

✕ PILOT, MULTI-ENGINE, AMPHIBIAN
(1067)

Pilots multi-engine amphibious aircraft and commands crew in the accomplishment of search, reconnaissance, and rescue missions. Ascertain prior to take-off that the aircraft is properly inspected, manned, and equipped; takes off, operates, and lands aircraft under various weather conditions; observes sea conditions and makes decision concerning landings at sea and in unmarked and strange areas, and under such hazards as adverse weather, enemy attacks, and low altitude and night flying; maintains flight records and reports observations made during missions.

Must have thorough knowledge of general and local flying regulations and meteorology. Must know tactics used against hostile fighter attacks.

Must meet prescribed physical standards. Must be a rated pilot and have completed transition and tactical training in multi-engine amphibious aircraft.

✕ GUIDED MISSILES OFFICER (1181)

To be used only for the classification of graduates of the Guided Missiles Course, 44-0-5, The Artillery School—Antiaircraft and Guided Missiles Branch.

A specification for this MOS will be published at a later date.

✕ ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER, M. A. S.
(2122)

Provides administrative services for an office of the Military Attaché System by supervising preparation or preparing correspondence, reports, requisitions, and personnel and finance records, and by processing of cryptographic messages, purchases and contracts; serves as class B agent finance officer. Receives, examines and routes incoming correspondence and other communications; prepares routine correspondence and maintains office file system; prepares special orders; supervises

preparation of registered mail pouches; reads and digests official publications and directives. Interviews visitors seeking information on a variety of subjects and answers their inquiries or arranges interview with Military Attaché; attends social functions as a representative of the Military Attaché's Office; receives visiting United States citizens and foreign dignitaries. Prepares requisition for supplies, contracts for and purchases items of supply on the local market when procurement through normal channels is not feasible. Maintains records for military personnel and civilian employees and prepares military and civilian payrolls; arranges payment for travel of dependents and the shipment of household goods. Acts as class B agent officer for the station; prepares finance vouchers and checks in payment of disbursement vouchers and pay rolls; maintains fiscal records such as obligation and expenditure ledgers and status of funds; prepares regular monthly finance reports; maintains data for preparation of budget estimates; prepares correspondence relative to fiscal matters. Receives and sends official coded and clear messages by cable or radio; encodes and decodes messages; determines cryptographic systems to be utilized; maintains inventory of all registered cryptographic and other registered materials; safeguards all classified material; supervises the destruction of classified material.

May arrange landing clearances for United States aircraft. May prepare material for incorporation in intelligence reports based on contacts with local community. May perform administrative, personnel, fiscal, or supply duties in the Intelligence Division between tours of foreign duty.

Must be thoroughly familiar with Army organization and administration. Must have extensive experience in administrative assignments. Must be able to adjust to long periods of service in foreign communities permitting only limited social contact with United States citizens.

Should have the ability to speak, read, and write one or more foreign language; should be versed in protocol and techniques of diplomacy.

✕ RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT
COORDINATOR (2167)

Performs planning and/or supervisory duties relative to research and development projects.

Assists in supervising planning for mobiliza-

tion of national personnel and matériel resources in the field of research and development; directs or approves the initiation of projects and allocates responsibility; determines priorities; coordinates related projects; insures consideration of interest of the using arm or service in connection with Department of the Army research and development activities; analyzes strategic and operational plans and research and development projects to determine their total effect; makes appropriate recommendations to interested general and special staff agencies, United States Army, and adjusts program to fulfil strategic and operational requirements; coordinates Department of the Army research and development plans and research projects with those of other Government agencies and foreign nations; compiles and maintains, on current basis, information on research facilities and capabilities of the nation of interest to the Army and evaluates military significant scientific advances of this and foreign nations.

Scientific, technical, or engineering background appropriate to specific assignment desirable.

Must have working knowledge of field of research and development to be supervised and thorough familiarity with Army organization. Experience with an AGF or Service board very desirable. Service in combat zone desirable.

Graduation from Command and General Staff College desirable.

✧ RESEARCH PSYCHOLOGIST (2231)

Plans, formulates, supervises, or conducts psychological research pertaining to a wide variety of military problems, such as procurement, selection, classification, assignment, and training of personnel; design and use of training aids and military equipment; measurement and evaluation of performance and achievement; measurement and control of morale; and surveys of opinions and attitudes.

Employs available tests, rating scales, questionnaires, and other devices which will aid in the solution of these problems. Develops various types of psychological measuring devices, such as written and performance tests of aptitude and proficiency; personality inventories; rating scales; standardized interviews; and questionnaires. Develops experimental apparatus or equipment needed to conduct necessary research. Employs

experimental and statistical techniques; collects data relevant to the specific problems, such as test scores and personal data; prepares reports and recommendations.

Must have experience in experimental psychology, developmental psychology, social psychology, physiological psychology, psychometrics, statistical methods, or related branches of applied psychology.

Must have a Doctor's degree based in part upon a psychological dissertation conferred by a graduate school of recognized standing or must have been certified in a field of professional psychology by a specialty board acceptable to the Department of the Army.

Note. This MOS will not be used for personnel who do not meet the specifications of the preceding paragraph. See MOS PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSISTANT (2239) for psychological personnel having lesser qualifications.

✧ CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGIST (2232)

As a member of the neuropsychiatric team in any station dealing with the problems of military personnel having disabilities of a psychological nature, performs one or more of the duties described in the following paragraphs.

Applies psychological principles and techniques as aids to the diagnosis and treatment of individuals; administers and interprets projective and other psychological tests, including those of personality, intelligence, motor coordination, achievement, vocational aptitude, and interests.

Carries out remedial therapy in cases of aphasia, speech, hearing, visual, habit, and motor defects; counsels on educational and vocational problems, and on changes in military occupational specialty for military personnel having neuropsychiatric or other psychological disabilities; assists in or carries out psychotherapy under neuropsychiatric supervision.

Performs experimental research as related to the evaluation of current and proposed methods of therapy and diagnosis, the dynamics of normal and abnormal behavior and problems of personality development.

Provides instruction and training in the principles and practices of clinical psychology to appropriate members of the neuropsychiatric staff and others; assists in the program of orienting

officers and enlisted men in personal adjustment problems.

Recommends revision of policies to improve use of clinical psychology personnel; serves as liaison officer in clinical psychology between other military and civilian agencies.

Must have a Doctor's degree based in part upon a psychological dissertation conferred by a graduate school of recognized standing or must have been certified in clinical psychology by a specialty board acceptable to the Department of the Army.

Note. This MOS will not be used for personnel who do not meet the specifications of the preceding paragraph. See MOS PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSISTANT (2239) for psychological personnel having lesser qualifications.

PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSISTANT (2239)

Assists a PERSONNEL PSYCHOLOGIST (2230), RESEARCH PSYCHOLOGIST (2231), or a CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGIST (2232) by performing selected aspects of those military occupational specialties under direction of such a specialist, or when not so supervised, undertakes simpler duties of a psychological nature requiring limited professional judgment and training.

Must have completed a full 4-year course in a college or university of recognized standing, which has included or been supplemented by at least one course in each of the following fields: general, educational, or dynamic psychology; psychological statistics, or group tests and measurements; experimental or physiological psychology; test construction, educational research methods, or individual psychological testing.

Note. This MOS will be used for personnel who meet the specifications of the preceding paragraph but who have not attained the standards required for an MOS as PERSONNEL PSYCHOLOGIST (2230), RESEARCH PSYCHOLOGIST (2231), CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGIST (2232).

INSTRUCTOR, ECONOMIC MOBILIZATION (2729)

Instructs military personnel in and supervises study of theory and techniques of planning economic mobilization and demobilization, wartime procurement, and disposal of surplus stores.

Conducts classes or supervises study in one or more of the following:

History of economic mobilization and planning thereof in the United States and foreign

countries, including organization and functions of Federal agencies and the mobilization of the national war potential;

Organization, functions and management of civilian, Army, Navy, and joint agencies for planning, determining, and coordinating military and civilian requirements;

Economic resources and war potentials of nations, alliances, and occupied areas, and wartime economic relations of the nations of the world;

Social problems in war, such as manpower policies; selecting and training industrial personnel; price and wage controls; and labor and industrial relations;

Natural resources and their conservation and stock piling; allocations, scheduling, production and distribution of commodities; food, fuel, and power systems; specifications for manufactured products; the negotiation, renegotiation and termination of contracts; packaging, storage and transportation of supplies and matériel;

Agencies for research and development of munitions and their procurement.

Must be thoroughly familiar with the historical, political, economic, social, and military implications of economic mobilization. Must be able to apply research and pedagogical techniques in the preparation of lecture and study materials at the graduate college level, and in the formulation of curricula and laying out of courses of instruction.

Must be a graduate of the National War College, Industrial College of the Armed Forces, Armed Forces Staff College, Naval War College, or Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration, or possess the equivalent in training and experience.

Civilian experience in teaching desirable.

ELECTROENCEPHALOGRAPHER (3127)

Directs or supervises the management and functioning of an electroencephalographic laboratory. Trains technicians in the operation of the apparatus and supervises the obtaining of electroencephalograms.

Classifies electroencephalograms according to the form and frequency of the brain waves recorded and interprets their significance in the light of own knowledge of neuropsychiatric diseases and disorders. Correlates electroencephalographic

data with clinical findings of ward medical officers. Aids in the diagnosis of epilepsy and organic brain diseases by rendering diagnostic-impression reports based upon electroencephalograms, and similarly contributes information concerning neuropsychiatric cases in general. Makes suggestions as to further diagnosis and therapy. Devises special recording techniques pertinent to the clinical problem under consideration.

Must have had adequate training and/or experience in this field as determined under the provisions of Appendix II.

Must be graduate of a medical school approved by The Surgeon General.

✕ ORTHODONTIST (3173)

Examines, diagnoses, and treats impairments of the masticatory function such as malocclusion, shifted teeth, and injuries or abnormalities of the maxillary, mandibular, and adjacent bones.

Must be licensed to practice dentistry. Must be engaged in active, ethical practice of dentistry at time of appointment.

Extensive training or experience in practice of orthodontia essential.

Must be a graduate of an accredited dental college. Post graduate study in orthodontia very desirable.

✕ PHARMACY OFFICER (3318)

Plans, supervises, and participates in pharmaceutical activities at an Army hospital or other medical installation or organization.

Supervises and instructs enlisted personnel in the performance of pharmaceutical duties including the compounding and dispensing of medicines; the maintenance of prescription files; the manufacture of pharmaceutical preparations and stock solutions, and the storage of bulk chemicals; the safekeeping and issuance of poisons, alcohol and alcoholic liquors, narcotics, and other dangerous and habit-forming drugs; the requisition and procurement of medical and pharmaceutical supplies, and their standardization, storage, and testing; the selection, storage, and refrigeration of biological products; and the routine preparation and sterilization of selected injectable medication which can be prepared in the pharmacy.

Prepares and enforces standards to safeguard drugs and medical supplies against possible dete-

rioration. Determines quality, purity; and strength of pharmaceuticals in accordance with specifications in the United States Pharmacopeia, National Formulary, and other official compendia. Assists in preparation of special standards and specifications for drugs and medical supplies to meet requirements peculiar to the installation served. Provides medical officers with information concerning new developments in the field of pharmacy and drug therapy and instructs medical personnel in methods of handling new drugs; advises on pharmaceutical and chemical problems involved in the preparation and administration of therapeutic agents. Maintains an adequate pharmaceutical reference library. Performs and supervises laboratory tests germane to pharmaceutical service. Prepares reports and recommendations based upon research, surveys, and investigations bearing upon the economical and efficient use of drugs and medical supplies.

Must be a graduate of a 4-year course at a college or school of pharmacy approved by The Surgeon General.

Civilian experience as a hospital pharmacist and state licensure very desirable.

✕ OPTOMETRY OFFICER (3340)

Conducts external examinations of the human eyes and their appendages, using instruments such as retinoscope, ophthalmometer and skiascope, and prescribes treatment to conserve or improve vision without the use of medicine, drugs or surgery.

Ascertain the presence or absence of defects or abnormal conditions which can be corrected, remedied, or relieved by the use of lenses, prisms, or other ophthalmic devices; determines such refractive errors as farsightedness, nearsightedness, or astigmatism, and accommodative conditions, the range of power or vision, and the ability and ease with which the eyes maintain clear, comfortable, binocular vision at any distance of fixation; rectifies errors of refraction and corrects imbalances of the optical muscles by prescribing or administering visual training when appropriate; prescribes lenses to correct visual defects; examines and tests lenses for proper workmanship and conformance to prescription; refers patients having manifestations of disease to a medical practitioner for treatment which requires medicine, drugs, or surgery; supervises and instructs personnel as-

signed to the operation of an optometry section; maintains clinical records.

Must be a graduate of an accredited college or school of optometry requiring at least 4 years for an undergraduate degree, and be licensed to practice in one of the 48 States or in the District of Columbia.

X OCCUPATIONAL THERAPIST (3416)

Supervises occupational therapy program at a medical installation. Plans, supervises, and administers occupational therapy treatment for physical disabilities in order to increase range of motion in joints, develop muscle power, and improve coordination; provides a program of controlled and guided activity for neuropsychiatric patients; observes and reports significant patterns of behavior in neuropsychiatric patients to the psychiatrist for diagnostic and treatment purposes; instructs enlisted occupational therapy technicians in craft and activity techniques, such as woodworking, jewelry making, leatherwork, metalwork and minor crafts used in treating patients; participates in ward rounds, clinical conferences and instructional programs conducted by the physical medicine service; develops and supervises programs for treatment of amputees, tubercular patients and other special categories of patients; prepares records and progress reports on individual patients; prepares requisitions and controls use of supplies and equipment.

Must be a college graduate with major study in biological science, industrial arts, or psychology.

Must be a graduate of a course in occupational therapy approved by The Surgeon General.

X FOOD SERVICE SUPERVISOR (4114)

Directs or supervises the storage, distribution, preparation, and serving of food and related activities. Interprets regulations and disseminates instructions on food service activities, except on such matters as are delegated to The Surgeon General; notes violations of regulations, directions, or instructions, and recommends corrective action to appropriate authority; develops and administers programs for the improvement of food service, conservation, and the elimination of waste; advises commanders and supervisory mess personnel on solution of various food service problems; organizes and directs surveys of individual food

preference, food requirements, food conservation, mess operations, menu planning, and related matters; inspects food service activities for adherence to established procedures, work standards, and methods of preparation and conservation, and recommends corrective action; coordinates selection, training, and utilization of food service personnel to provide for efficient mess operations; coordinates activities with and furnishes technical advice and assistance to medical personnel on matters of health, sanitation, nutrition, and other matters pertaining to food service operations.

Must have thorough knowledge of procurement, storage, distribution, preparation, and service of subsistence items. Must be familiar with the operation of central meat cutting plants, fat rendering plants, central pastry and bread bakeries, and refrigeration plants and maintenance of their equipment. Must have sufficient knowledge of dietetic principles to plan and review menus for nutritional adequacy, dietary balance, and attractiveness, taking into consideration availability of items. Must be familiar with the operation of field as well as fixed kitchens and other food service facilities.

Must be graduate of a food service supervisor's course prescribed for officers by The Quartermaster General for the award of this MOS after 1 June 1947.

Civilian experience in the management of a cafeteria, restaurant, or similar enterprise desirable.

College or technical school education and civilian training in food preparation and service, dietetics, or nutrition desirable.

X PHYSICAL RECONDITIONING OFFICER (5525)

Supervises and administers physical reconditioning activities at a medical installation in order to accelerate recovery, prevent physical deterioration and aid in psychological readjustment of all categories of hospital patients. Plans and schedules individual and group physical reconditioning activities, such as general conditioning and developmental exercises, aquatics and athletics for bed, ambulatory and advanced convalescent patients on prescription of a medical officer; participates in ward rounds and clinical conferences to determine suitable activities for patients and to evaluate results of treatment; assigns physical re-

conditioning instructors to conduct various phases of program, informing them of current procedures and techniques, outlining exercises adjusted to individual limitations and capacities; renders progress reports on reconditioning activities and on individual patients when requested; requisitions and controls use of supplies and equipment used in physical reconditioning; inspects physical reconditioning facilities to discover and eliminate defective apparatus and other safety hazards.

Must be a graduate of a recognized college or university with major study in physical education.

Must be a graduate of the Physical Reconditioning Officers' Course given by the Medical Department.

Civilian experience as a physical instructor or athletic coach desirable.

✧ SUBMARINE MINE CASEMATE ENGINEER (7605)

Supervises operation and maintenance of a submarine mine control system in a submarine mine casemate, exercising technical supervision over the installation, operation, testing, adjustment, and maintenance of auxiliary power plant, mine control equipment, underwater and surface detection apparatus, submarine mine cables, and cable installations. Prepares estimates, plans, and work orders for, and supervises new construction, cable laying, and installation of new control equipment. Conducts periodic inspections of mine control and related equipment to determine serviceability and operating efficiency; performs operational and experimental tests on standard and experimental mine control equipment, using electrical and electronic testing instruments such as cathode ray oscilloscope, circuit analyzer, vacuum tube tester, electronic voltmeter, electronic switch, square wave generator, ammeter, decade resistor, and various electrician's hand tools; trouble shoots, tests, and adjusts firing devices and other mine control apparatus; observes operating characteristics and inherent functional tendencies of devices as indicated by graphic recordings; studies circuits, applies various principles of electricity and electronics, and makes adjustments or modifications on control equipment; tests for and localizes faults in cable by capacity measurements, determination of frequency increment between maximum impedance

points, and other methods. Serves as technical advisor and prepares technical reports on the current status, capabilities, and limitations of mine control system, influence of tides, local magnetic disturbances, and other hydrographic and geographic factors affecting normal operation of a control system; provides personnel of mine planting flotilla with current information on status of mine field prior to and during mine planting operations; acts as technical representative at conferences involving coordination between the Army, Navy, and commercial cable agencies. Trains operators and technicians by orally explaining and manually demonstrating operating procedures and techniques and by preparing work notes and simplified wiring diagrams for use of technicians in testing and maintenance work; prepares instructional material and conducts classes for training of enlisted operators and technicians; may conduct orientation courses in fundamentals of submarine mine control operations for Army and Navy officers. Inspects casemate and cable records for accuracy and completeness; prepares special and periodic reports on status and operating efficiency of standard equipment and on the operating characteristics and capabilities of experimental equipment undergoing service test.

Must know operating principles, theory, and characteristics of submarine mine control systems, mine firing devices, radar detection equipment, underwater sonic detection equipment, submarine mine cable, gasoline and Diesel internal combustion engines and power generators, and be familiar with mine planting equipment and mine planting operations in general. Must know theory and principles of AC and DC electricity; electronics; physics of heat, light, and sound; mechanics; algebra; plane geometry, and trigonometry; and elements of chemistry.

Must have completed casemate electrician's course at the Coast Artillery School, and at least 2 years of practical experience in related specialties in a submarine mine casemate or depot.

Should have civilian experience in the design, modification, or manufacture of electrical control or communication equipment or electronic devices.

College or technical school training with specialization in electrical engineering, electronics, or advanced physics very desirable.

X COUNTERINTELLIGENCE OFFICER (CIC) (9302)

Collects, evaluates, and disseminates information pertaining to enemy activity, sabotage, or subversive activities. Organizes and supervises surveys and investigations; reviews, evaluates, and forwards counterintelligence reports; makes recommendations regarding counterintelligence activities; maintains liaison with local and Federal investigative agencies or similar agencies of friendly countries. May be responsible for indoctrination of personnel in security measures, safeguarding of military information, and censorship, or for the planning of such programs. May conduct or direct the installation and operations of countersubversive measures, counterespionage systems, or countersabotage activities.

Must have successfully completed a course of training conducted by the Counter Intelligence Corps.

Must be familiar with investigative procedures and policies. Should have thorough knowledge of the language and political institutions of one or more foreign countries.

Military experience in post intelligence operations or staff experience in intelligence planning very desirable. Clearance by the Director of Intelligence, General Staff, United States Army, is essential.

Civilian experience in legal, investigative, auditing, or journalistic work very desirable.

Should be college graduate; degree in law desirable.

Note. Intelligence staff officers performing counterintelligence duties on a staff level will be classified and reported as "Intelligence Staff Officer, Combat (9301)" when assigned as a G-2 or S-2 in a field unit, and will be classified as "Intelligence Officer (9307)" when assigned as an intelligence staff officer to a fixed post, camp, or station. Officers performing counterintelligence duties are not authorized the classification of MOS Counterintelligence Officer (CIC) (9302) unless such officers are actually members of the Counter Intelligence Corps.

Applications may be submitted to The Adjutant General (AGSO-A) through channels to change the classification of warrant officers originally appointed in other classifications who are now performing the specialty indicated above.

2. Changes

a. The titles for the following codes are changed in section II as indicated:

b. Specifications and title for PERSONNEL CONSULTANT (2230), PHYSICAL THERAPIST (3180), and PHYSICAL THERAPY AIDE (3418), and specifications for MESS OFFICER (4110) and MILITARY POLICE OFFICER (9110), respectively, are changed in section III as follows:

✕ PERSONNEL PSYCHOLOGIST (2230)

Advises commanding, staff, and line officers on personnel matters of a psychological nature.

Administers or supervises administration of psychological tests to military personnel for classification and assignment purposes; determines type of test to be given, such as individual or group tests of intelligence, educational achievement, vocational aptitude, special skill, interest, and adjustment; administers or supervises administration of tests, prepares reports of test ratings, and recommends classification and assignment in accordance with approved personnel management policies and procedures.

Advises on the selection, method of training, assignment and reassignment of illiterates and other personnel who are slow to meet military requirements and makes recommendations regarding their disposition; advises on classification and assignment of individuals with special abilities, and in the selection of personnel for specialized assignment or training.

Interviews or supervises interviewing of individuals concerning occupations, educational courses or military occupational specialties appropriate to interests, needs, and abilities, and advises regarding vocational, educational, avocational, or personal problems of military personnel who do not have neuropsychiatric or psychological disabilities; provides vocational and educational guidance to military personnel being separated from the service; refers personnel with indications of mental or emotional disturbance to the proper neuropsychiatric agencies.

Advises on general and special personnel problems, on the development of techniques in personnel administration, and in the analysis of factors affecting morale and general welfare of troops.

Must have a Doctor's degree based in part upon a psychological dissertation conferred by a graduate school of recognized standing, or must have

been certified in Personal Psychology by a specialty board acceptable to the Department of the Army.

Note. This MOS will not be used for personnel who do not meet the specifications of the preceding paragraph. See MOS PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSISTANT (2239) for psychological personnel having lesser qualifications.

✕ PHYSICAL MEDICINE OFFICER (3180)

Directs or supervises administration of the physical medicine program at a medical installation. Supervises the treatment of sick and injured by means of physical therapy, occupational therapy, and physical reconditioning; prescribes individual courses of treatment which include the employment of the physical and other effective diagnostic and therapeutic properties of light, heat, cold, water, electricity, massage, exercise, mechanical devices, occupational therapy, and physical reconditioning; develops therapeutic techniques and directs training programs in various branches of physical medicine.

Must have special knowledge of regenerative processes of the body and be able to evaluate physical medicine techniques.

Must be a graduate of a course of training in physical medicine approved by The Surgeon General or have equivalent knowledge gained from experience in this field. Must be a graduate of a medical school approved by The Surgeon General.

✕ PHYSICAL THERAPIST (3418)

Supervises and administers program of physical therapy treatment at a medical installation. Performs or supervises, on prescription of a medical officer, the application of massage, therapeutic exercises, electrotherapy, hydrotherapy, phototherapy and other diagnostic and therapeutic measures. Participates in ward rounds, clinical conferences, and instructional programs conducted by the physical medicine service. Prepares records and progress reports on individual patients. Requisitions and controls use of supplies and equipment used in physical therapy clinics.

Must be a graduate of an accredited college or university with major study in physical education or biological science. Must be a graduate of a course in physical therapy approved by The Surgeon General.

X MESS OFFICER (4110)

Supervises the operation of messing facilities within a command. Supervises the preparation of menus, procurement and unit storage of food rations, preparation of food in kitchens, serving of food in mess halls, and care of mess equipment and facilities; inspects food during and after preparation for quality and quantity and inspects equipment and personnel for observance of sanitary regulations; inspects stored food for spoilage; institutes methods of food conservation; supervises on-the-job training program for mess attendants, cooks, and mess stewards; supervises the keeping of supply and equipment records and mess accounts.

Must have working knowledge of requisitioning and unit storage of food rations, preparation and serving of food items, and care of mess equipment. Must have sufficient knowledge of dietetic principles to plan menus for nutritional adequacy, dietary balance, and attractiveness, taking availability of items into consideration. Must be able to supervise activities of field and fixed kitchens.

Must be graduate of a mess management course prescribed for officers by The Quartermaster General for the award of this MOS after 1 June 1947.

Civilian experience in the management of a cafeteria, restaurant, or similar commercial or institutional activity desirable.

X MILITARY POLICE OFFICER (9110)

Commands a military police unit and is responsible for its administration, training and tactical employment. Directs supply, transportation and security activities of unit.

Supervises enforcement of laws, rules and regulations pertaining to the maintenance of order and discipline; supervises the performance of interior guard duty; provides for traffic control in military areas; and controls the movement of personnel to, from, and within military areas; assists civil police by maintaining order among military personnel, taking into custody unauthorized absentees and other military offenders, and providing information to military personnel and civilians; directs and supervises military police in the prevention and investigation of crime, in the protection of property and vital installations, in the suppression

of riots or civil commotions and in guarding supply points against pilferage.

May plan, coordinate and supervise the collection, processing and custody of prisoners of war. May direct the circulation and handling of refugees and other displaced persons.

Must possess working knowledge of military police organization, methods, techniques, equipment and weapons; must possess force, initiative, resourcefulness, tact and good appearance.

Military experience essential, including graduation from appropriate courses at the Military Police School.

Administrative or executive experience in traffic control, police administration or legal work desirable.

d. Paragraph 2, appendix III, is superseded by the following:

2. Change in Classification of Warrant Officers

a. For regulations governing change of classification of warrant officers holding temporary appointments in the Army of the United States, see AR 610-15.

b. Military occupational specialties may be awarded to warrant officers in addition to the MOS's prescribed for their particular category as indicated in paragraph 1 above. These additional MOS's will be awarded and recorded on WD AGO Form 66 in the same manner as prescribed for officer personnel according to procedures set forth in paragraph 67, TM 12-425A, and paragraph 7, Circular 240, War Department, 1947. The award of any such MOS is for record purposes only and does not authorize the use of any MOS not specifically indicated in paragraph 1 above for inclusion in tables of organization and equipment or tables of distribution.

x (1) PERSONNEL TESTING OFFICER (2250)—the qualifications of officers currently classified as PERSONNEL TESTING OFFICER (2250) will be reviewed to determine eligibility for a currently authorized MOS. If no other MOS is appropriate, the individual will be classified as PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSISTANT (2239).

x (2) PSYCHOLOGIST, AVIATION (2251)—the qualifications of officers currently classified as PSYCHOLOGIST, AVIATION (2251) will be reviewed to determine eligibility for a currently authorized MOS. It is likely that either RESEARCH PSYCHOLOGIST (2231) or PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSISTANT (2239) will be appropriate.

x (3) PSYCHOLOGIST (2252)—the qualifications of officers currently classified as PSYCHOLOGIST (2252) will be reviewed to determine eligibility for a currently authorized MOS. It is likely that RESEARCH PSYCHOLOGIST (2231) or CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGIST (2232) or PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSISTANT (2239) will be appropriate.

4. Military Occupational Specialty Conversion

a. Regardless of previous MOS classification, the qualifications of commissioned and warrant officers who perform duties covered by the specifications in paragraph 1 above will be reviewed to determine whether award of the newly announced classification as a primary or an additional MOS is warranted. If an additional MOS is to be awarded, the procedures contained in paragraph 71, TM 12-425A, will be followed, but where a conversion of a primary MOS is involved, procedures outlined in paragraphs 73 and 74, TM 12-425A, will govern. Officer's, Warrant Officer's, and Flight Officer's Qualification Record (WD AGO Form 66) and personnel reports, where appropriate, will be prepared using the conversion instructions given in *b* below as a guide. This guide consists of examples of military occupational specialties in use from which a conversion to an MOS announced above may need to be made. These examples are not to be construed to limit the military occupational specialties from which conversion may need to be made. Furthermore, commissioned and warrant officers previously awarded military occupational specialties enumerated below will not automatically be given one of the new military occupational specialties as a primary or additional classification. In each instance, a careful review must be made of the qualifications of the individual to determine whether classification in a new MOS is warranted.
