b. The following titles, codes, and specifications for military occupational specialties are added in numerical sequence to section III:

**TRANSPORTATION MOVEMENTS
OFFICER (0694)**

Assists the staff transportation officer of a command by performing, planning, coordinating, and controlling functions in connection with all personnel and supply movements of the command.

Consolidates all movement requirements of the command. Ascertains the capabilities of available transportation facilities, and advises staff transportation officer concerning requirements for additional transportation. Coordinates movement plans with interested staff sections, arms and services, shippers, and receivers, and with movement officers of other commands. Coordinates movements to effect economy in use of transportation

facilities and to avoid congestion of facilities. Determines means of transportation to be employed in the execution of movements and prepares movement schedules. Prepares directives for movements and exercises staff supervision over movements.

Must have general knowledge of the operational and administrative techniques employed in the movement of military personnel and supplies by air, rail, highway, and water. Must be familiar with Army organization. Must be familiar with commercial traffic policies, practices and procedures.

Should have credit for the Transportation Officer School Advanced Course.

Civilian experience in the field of transportation desirable.

UNIT ADMINISTRATOR (2123)

Assists company commander in supervising company administration, supply, and mess activities.

Assists the company commander in supervision of company administration. Supervises routine administration of company headquarters to include preparation of rosters, reports, correspondence, and unit records. Advises enlisted personnel on such matters as savings, war bonds, insurance, family allotments, and other personal welfare and related matters. Acts as investigating officer (except for investigation of court-martial charges under the Forty-Sixth Article of War), member of appropriate courts and boards, and agent finance officer or witnessing officer in the payment of troops when so designated by competent authority.

Assists company commander in supervision of mess operation, to include supervision of mess accounting and proper preparation and serving of food. Conducts inventories and checks on proper receipt and disposition of rations for compliance with existing directives and regulations.

Assists the company commander in supervision of supply matters, including requisitions, receipts, storage, issue, salvage, and maintenance of supplies and equipment and related records. Conducts inventories of supplies and equipment both in the supply room and in hands of unit personnel and checks records of supplies and equipment.

Must be thoroughly qualified as a grade 1 or 2 enlisted man in combat arms units.

Must have a thorough knowledge of Army clerical, personnel, and administrative procedures. Must have a thorough knowledge of regulations and forms applicable to company level operations.

Must be able to interpret and utilize tables of organization and equipment, tables of allowances, standard nomenclature lists, and other supply publications. Must have a basic knowledge of Army Regulations governing accountability, responsibility, and supply procedure, including necessary action in event of loss or damage to Government property. Must have a basic knowledge of supply channels serving the company.

Must have a thorough knowledge of the Army Food Service Program as applicable to company messes.

INSTRUCTOR, MILITARY PSYCHOLOGY AND LEADERSHIP (2715)

Instructs or supervises instruction of military personnel in psychological principles of military leadership.

Teaches application of psychological point of view towards such military problems as morale, group relationships, discipline, rumor and panic, and propaganda, with special emphasis upon the practical techniques available to aid military leaders in solving them. Instructs in practical application of psychological principles to observation, performance and fatigue, personal adjustment, social relations, and related fields of military activity. Teaches role of military leader in motivating and managing subordinates. Explains and discusses attributes, selection, and development of effective military leaders.

Must be familiar with methods of teaching such as lecture, conference, demonstration, guided discussion, role playing, and case history method. Must be able to select appropriate method for a given phase of instruction, including use of instructional aids.

Military experience to include command of troops essential.

Graduate work in psychology, personnel management or related fields highly desirable.

RADIOLOGICAL DEFENSE MEDICAL OFFICER (3004)

Performs a variety of staff and advisory duties in connection with the medical aspects of radiological defense activities.

Recommends policies and prepares instructions on methods to be used in protecting personnel from the effects of radiological attack and coordinates policies and instructions with radiological defense programs of other government agencies. Advises on radiation hazards which may affect personnel of the command. Evaluates internal and external hazards of all types of ionizing radiation and their respective biological effects. Advises as to immediate, retarded and remote effects of radiation exposures of various dosages. Evaluates hazards of food and water contamination with radioactive materials. Supervises preparation and promulgation of information on radioactive effects for distribution to lower echelons. Advises on methods of evacuation, care and treatment of victims of radioactivity.

Supervises and inspects medical phases of radiological defense training of units of the command.

Must have successfully completed the prescribed post-graduate training in radio-biology, or have equivalent training and experience acceptable to the Department of the Army or the Department of the Air Force.

Must be a graduate of a medical school approved by the Surgeon General.

AIR FORCE STAFF SURGEON (3161)

Performs duties as surgeon or assistant surgeon on the special staff of an air force commander, in the Office of the Air Surgeon, or in an equivalent office of the Department of Defense.

Advises commander on matters affecting the health of personnel of the command and on the physical and mental qualifications affecting the flight status and ratings of the flying personnel of the command. Provides commander with professional information concerning medical activities and on unusual problems such as medical aspects of radiation hazards.

Establishes and directs the aeromedical program for flying personnel of the command and its medical units. Supervises the work of flight surgeons. Supervises the oxygen indoctrination and altitude training programs.

Prepares and directs execution of medical plans for the command. Recommends and supervises measures for prevention and control of disease within the command. Makes disposition of medical troops of the command. Determines location of medical facilities. Recommends appropriate stock levels for medical supplies and equipment and directs their procurement, storage and distribution.

Coordinates and directs medical activities of the command. Directs utilization of medical facilities. Coordinates medical, dental, veterinary, sanitary and other medical services through the chiefs of those activities. Directs and inspects measures for the care and treatment of sick and wounded of the command. Directs utilization and classification of medical department personnel of the command. Inspects medical activities, personnel, equipment, and medical administrative procedures and investigates conditions affecting health of the command.

Directs preparation and forwarding of routine and special medical records and reports.

In dual capacity of staff officer and commander of an air force station medical facility performs the additional duties of MEDICAL OFFICER, COMMAND (3500).

Must be rated Aircraft Observer (Medical), or a flight surgeon with several years' military experience with the medical service of the air force.

Must be a graduate of the United States Air Force School of Aviation Medicine and meet such other requirements as the Chief of Staff, United States Air Force, may specify.

Must be a graduate of a medical school or college approved by the Surgeon General.

FLIGHT SURGEON (3162)

Performs a variety of medical duties in connection with selection, care, and rehabilitation of flying personnel.

Performs special physical examinations of all flying personnel as required. Evaluates physical and mental qualifications of individuals participating regularly and frequently in aerial flights. Makes appropriate recommendations to command-

ing officer regarding the continuance on, return to, or suspension from flying status of such individuals. Indoctrinates all flying personnel in aeromedical subjects and physiology of flight, adapting level of instruction to backgrounds of individuals. Advises the commanding officer on aeromedical problems and on establishment and operation of aeromedical facilities in the absence of the AIR FORCE STAFF SURGEON (3161).

Performs general medical duties when assigned to an air force tactical unit and, in this capacity, exercises command and technical control of the medical organization of the unit and its personnel.

May teach or conduct research in field of aviation medicine.

Must be a graduate of the Aviation Medical Examiner's Course of the United States Air Force School of Aviation Medicine and meet such other requirements as the Chief of Staff, United States Air Force, may specify.

Must be a graduate of a medical school approved by the Surgeon General.

ORAL PATHOLOGIST (3177)

Practices the science of oral pathology, studying disease of tissue in the region of the oral cavity in all its aspects, and explaining the origin, course, clinical history and nature of various morbid conditions which disturb normal health.

Evaluates the pattern and progress of disease of the oral cavity and adjacent structures. Diagnoses diseases which effect changes in normal function of the oral cavity, explains the gross and microscopic changes in the tissue and organ combination, and in physical and chemical changes that interrupt functional mechanisms of defense. Makes diagnoses by gross and microscopic tissue appearance. Appraises diagnostic measures and treatment. Acts as consultant in obscure oral pathological conditions and instructs in the field of oral pathology.

Extensive training or experience in oral pathology essential. General knowledge of the field of pathology essential.

Must be a graduate of a medical or dental school approved by the Surgeon General.

MEDICAL RADIOLOGICAL LABORATORY OFFICER (3308)

Directs or supervises the activities of a radiation laboratory or a laboratory branch of a medical

or other installation which uses radioactive matériel.

Supervises preparation of samples for biological radio survey, counting samples to determine degree of radioactivity present, laboratory aspects of diagnosing radiation exposure, examination of personnel for ingested or inhaled radioactive substances, and making of radio autographs of body tissue.

Advises on the technical aspects of monitoring surveys in cases of disaster involving radiological hazards and on the types of instruments and methods to be used in making radiological surveys.

Must have successfully completed the prescribed post-graduate training in laboratory techniques, procedures, and facilities, peculiar to radiobiology, or have equivalent training and experience acceptable to the Department of the Army.

Must have had at least 4 years' training or experience in one of the medical allied sciences acquired in the Army, at a hospital, medical school, research agency, or governmental health agency.

Must be a graduate of an accredited college or university with specialization in one of the medical allied sciences.

COMPROLLER (6000)

Directs and coordinates budget, fiscal, statistical, audit and other business management functions of a major command and serves as technical advisor to the commanding general on all matters concerning effective and economical utilization of funds and personnel.

Directs preparation of military and civil budget estimates. Develops plans and procedures to meet budgetary problems and requirements. Surveys and develops improvements in accounting and auditing procedures throughout the command to provide effective control of operations and costs. Determines fiscal policies for the command within framework of policy established by Headquarters, Department of the Army. Directs and supervises collection, analysis, evaluation and presentation of statistical data and reports. Directs and supervises operation of reports control procedure. Directs surveys of manpower utilization in relation to appropriations in the interest of effective, economical and equitable personnel allocation. Directs analysis of command organizational structure and allocation of functional responsibilities among and within organizations of the command. Ana-

lyzes and makes recommendations regarding work flow and work methods.

Must have thorough knowledge of broad command problems, Army organization and administration. Extensive command and staff experience essential.

Must be familiar with fiscal matters and the utilization of statistics, audit activities, management engineering, and of the budget in army administration.

Professional experience or college training in business administration very desirable. Graduate of the Industrial College of the Armed Forces desirable.

RADIOLOGICAL DEFENSE ENGINEER (7330)

Performs a variety of staff and advisory duties in connection with the nonmedical aspects of radiological defense activities.

Recommends policies and prepares instructions relative to methods to be used in protecting personnel, facilities and matériel, from the effects of radiological attack and coordinates policies and instructions with radiological defense programs of other governmental and civilian agencies. Supervises and inspects radiological defense training of subordinate commands, insuring that they comply with directives establishing standards of instrumentation and personnel training; advises subordinate commands on technical problems involved in radiological defense measures and techniques. Evaluates radiological survey data obtained from subordinate commands. Directs and coordinates efforts of agencies which provide relief and assistance to areas subjected to radiological attack, by assisting them in the evaluation of radiological situation and in directing decontaminating operations. Examines captured radiological defense equipment, and evaluates information concerning status of enemy radiological weapons, defense equipment, and training methods. May assist in research and development activities pertaining to radiological techniques and matériel.

Must have successfully completed the prescribed post-graduate training in bio-radiology, or have equivalent training and experience acceptable to the Department of the Army or the Department of the Air Force.

GEOGRAPHER (8311)

Conducts and directs research into the geographical phenomena of the earth's surface to determine regional differences and to ascertain their probable effect upon military doctrine, planning, organization, training, equipment, supply, personnel and operations.

Employs systematic investigative procedures, including field work, exhaustive examination of published and restricted geographical studies and reports, and interpretation of maps and photographs, to determine: salient characteristics of the physical environment, such as climate, relief, soils, drainage and vegetation; cultural features, such as roads, railroads, and towns; and the bearing of these factors on economic aspects of natural resources and industries. Evaluates, correlates and synthesizes findings into reports in terms of military requirements, by application of the appropriate principles and techniques of climatology, physiography, coastal geography, hydrology, pedology, biogeography, ethnogeography, land use, urban geography, economic and industrial geography, political geography and geographical exploration.

Military experience in operations involving the application of geographical principles and techniques desirable.

A bachelor's degree in geography or climatology from an accredited institution essential.

Civilian professional experience in geographic research or teaching at the college or university level desirable.

2. Changes

a. Specifications in section III for the military occupational specialties listed below are changed to read as follows:

PASSENGER AND FREIGHT TRANSPORTATION OFFICER (0612)

Supervises routing, scheduling, loading and unloading, dispatching and other activities related to transportation of freight and passenger by air, rail, water and highway.

Supervises preparation, and coordination with interested agencies, of detailed plans for movement of personnel, supplies and equipment. Ascertains capabilities of available terminal facilities for handling movements. Keeps records of unit strengths, shipping weights and cubages of unit equipment. Arranges for essential transportation equipment and accommodations for freight shipments and troop movements by contacting authorized representatives of commercial or military transportation agencies. Supervises preparation and issuance of transportation documents. Supervises investigations of delays in supply movements and inspection of matériel damaged in transit. Instructs selected unit officers and enlisted personnel in preparation of equipment for shipment and in mechanics of loading, stowing and securing equipment for movement by air, rail, water, and highway.

Must know methods of loading, stowing and securing freight and cargo. Must know methods of marking and documenting shipments and use of applicable forms, tables and diagrams. Must be familiar with materials handling equipment. Must be able to determine loading characteristics of ships, landing craft, aircraft and railway equipment from plans, manuals or actual measurements.

Civilian experience in a railroad, steamship or other transportation agency or in an industrial concern involving supervision of freight shipment or passenger transportation activities desirable.

Completion of an army school course in passenger and freight transportation desirable.

CLASSIFICATION AND ASSIGNMENT OFFICER (2210)

Supervises personnel management activities within a military unit by planning classification procedures, supervising the interviewing, testing,

classification, and assignment of military personnel, executing personnel management phases of the career program for enlisted personnel and warrant officers, supervising preparation and maintenance of personnel qualification records, and supervising preparation of special and recurring reports on classification and assignment of military personnel.

Provides advice and assistance to commanding officers and staff officers on such matters as manpower control, budget, personnel authorizations and requirements, manpower utilization, and personnel management practices.

Supervises classification of officers on initial entry on extended active duty and on recall to extended active duty. Interviews officers and prepares officer qualification records. Evaluates qualifications of officers and recommends assignments to appropriate duties. Assists commanding officer in nominating officers for attending service school and other special assignments. Recommends assignment of officers to units during activation of organizations.

Supervises personnel management activities in the career program for warrant officers and enlisted personnel. Periodically directs the review of qualifications and assignments of warrant officers and enlisted personnel of subordinate units, and of headquarters to which assigned, in order to insure most efficient utilization of personnel and proper application of career management. Directs processing of papers and forms connected with advancement, and maintenance of records of unit vacancies. Counsels or supervises counseling of enlisted personnel in their careers, and provides guidance when enlisted personnel desire to change careers. Confers with information and education officers, and supervises the review of publications to determine what courses of self study are available for specific military occupational specialties.

Directs warrant officer and enlisted technicians engaged in classification and assignment of military personnel. Advises commanding officers on promotions, reclassifications, and demotions for individual enlisted men. Prepares personnel requisitions to keep units at authorized strength. Arranges for interview of all newly assigned enlisted personnel to insure correct duty assignment, to review qualification records for accuracy, and, if necessary, for correction of records by administering tests, adding or deleting information on rec-

ords, or initiating correspondence in order to obtain information. Installs procedures for keeping qualification records current, makes periodic audits of all classification records, and recommends necessary corrections. Recommends enlisted personnel for specialist training and schools. Recommends assignment, assigns, or approves assignments of personnel in accordance with publications and directives on personnel management. Assigns enlisted personnel to units on activation of an organization. Instructs and directs warrant officers and enlisted technicians in preparation of rosters and of special and recurring reports on classification and assignment of all military personnel, and reviews such reports for compliance with applicable directives.

Supervises administration, scoring, and interpretation of a variety of Army personnel tests designed to measure such factors as learning ability, general educational development, occupational interests, and proficiency in military occupational specialties. Observes administration of tests to insure proper testing conditions. Makes continuous inspections to insure that testing materials are properly safeguarded.

Supervises original interview and classification of all men enlisting or reenlisting in the Army, and reinterview of enlisted personnel who are undergoing or have completed basic training. Observes interviews for use of proper techniques and thoroughness, and periodically reinterviews personnel for verification. Instructs and supervises personnel management technicians in counseling enlisted personnel as to selection of career fields on basis of such factors as expressed interest, job history, schooling, and aptitude tests. Supervises initial assignment of personnel in accordance with procedures of career program.

Instructs and supervises personnel management technicians at separation installations or points engaged in counseling as to vocational, educational, or personal problems, and recommending selection of civilian jobs or schools based upon Army experience, expressed interests, and requirements of the civilian labor market. Supervises preparation of separation qualification records. Maintains liaison with local civilian and governmental agencies charged with rehabilitation, placement, and utilization of former service personnel, including the handicapped.

INSTRUCTOR, ECONOMIC MOBILIZATION (2729)

Instructs selected officers of the Armed Forces and selected civilians in major phases of the national economy by conducting classes and supervising study in one or more of the following: orientation in broad aspects of world-wide political, economic and power patterns; the economic war potential of the nations of the world and of special blocs of nations and analysis of the relationship of the economic potential to political, military and psychological factors in our national strategy; the organization and administration of the Department of Defense and other government agencies concerned with mobilization of the national economy for war and later peacetime reconversion; methods of formulating and means of implementing joint logistic plans and the relation of these plans to joint strategic plans and to the national economy; the procurement, production, and distribution aspects of mobilization for war and reconversions to peacetime conditions; manpower problems encountered in connection with mobilization of the economy and mobilization of the military forces; relationship between technological progress and the mobilization of the national economy; any phase of economic mobilization of the United States or foreign countries considered significant to the national defense.

Must have thorough knowledge of the historical, political, economic, social, and military implications of economic mobilization. Must be able to apply research and pedagogical techniques in the preparation of lecture and study materials at the graduate college level, and in the formulation of curricula and laying out of courses of instruction.

Graduation from the National War College, Industrial College of the Armed Forces, Armed Forces Staff College, Naval War College, or a recognized graduate school of business administration, public administration, political science, or international relations, very desirable.

Military or civilian teaching experience at the college or graduate level very desirable.

MEDICAL OFFICER, STAFF (3000)

Performs duties as surgeon or assistant surgeon on the special staff of a division or higher headquarters command, in the Office of the Surgeon General, or in an equivalent office of the Department of Defense.

Prepares and directs execution of medical plans for the command. Recommends and supervises execution of measures for prevention and control of disease within the command, among prisoners of war and native populations of occupied territories including displaced persons. Establishes procedures for the collection, clearing, and evacuation of casualties. Plans and directs individual and unit training of medical troops. Makes disposition of medical troops of the command. Determines location of medical facilities. Recommends appropriate stock levels for medical supplies and equipment and directs their procurement, storage and distribution. Provides commander with professional information and advice concerning medical activities and on unusual problems such as the medical aspects of radiation hazards. Advises commander on training of non-medical troops in military sanitation and first aid.

Coordinates and directs medical activities of the command. Directs and inspects measures for the care and treatment of sick and wounded of the command. Directs utilization and classification of medical department personnel of the command. Coordinates and directs tactical employment of medical units and utilization of medical facilities. Coordinates dental, veterinary and other medical services through the chiefs of those activities. Inspects medical activities, personnel, equipment, and medical administrative procedures and investigates conditions affecting health of the command.

Directs preparation and forwarding of routine and special medical records and reports. Directs the examination of captured medical documents and equipment to obtain information of value to medical intelligence.

In dual capacity of staff officer and commander of a fixed medical installation, such as post surgeon or commander of station hospital, performs appropriate additional duties of MEDICAL OFFICER, COMMAND (3500).

May serve as member of a military mission or as an assistant military attaché.

Post-graduate training or experience in the fields of public health, hospital administration, personnel administration, radiation hazards, or in medical library and medical education administration in military or civilian institutions essential.

Must have extensive professional and military medical experience.

Must be a graduate of a medical school approved by the Surgeon General.

MEDICAL OFFICER, GENERAL (3100)

Performs general medical duties including examination and treatment of sick and wounded personnel in hospitals, dispensaries, field units, or other military medical installations or units.

Conserves the health of individuals by application of a diversified knowledge of preventive, diagnostic and therapeutic medical and surgical measures, and gives patients individual attention. Performs surgical procedures in emergencies and seeks the advice of experts in limited fields when indicated by circumstances. Supervises and instructs other medical department personnel including nurses, dietitians, physical therapists, occupational therapists, and enlisted technicians in the prevention of disease and injury, as well as the care and treatment of sick and wounded personnel, together with techniques of adapting this professional knowledge to field and wartime conditions. Uses professional skill and judgment in analysis of social and economic factors of disease processes, and in establishing measures for their control.

Must be a graduate of a medical school approved by the Surgeon General.

DAIRY PRODUCTS INSPECTOR (3223)

Examines sanitary conditions under which milk and other dairy products are produced and processed. Supervises and instructs commissioned and enlisted personnel in performance of dairy inspection duties; investigates and evaluates the efficiency of inspection system maintained by civilian agencies and advises as to corrective procedures; acts as advisor and consultant on dairy sanitation and hygiene.

Must have extensive experience in dairy sanitation.

Must be a graduate of an accredited veterinary college approved by the Surgeon General.

MEDICAL OFFICER, COMMAND (3500)

Commands a field or mobile military station, installation or unit with the primary mission of furnishing medical care or other medical services devised to maintain health or to further the physical and mental recovery of sick and injured personnel.

Recommends or establishes medical policies, and directs professional, administrative and tactical

medical activities of the command including admission, care, treatment and disposition of patients, training of medical personnel, administration of medical records and reports, and procurement and disposition of medical supplies and equipment. As commander of a table of organization medical unit, such as a medical group, battalion or company, directs tactical employment of the unit, determines location of medical facilities and disposition of medical troops of the command, directs the collection, clearing, and evacuation of casualties, and prepares recommendations to higher authority on matters affecting the command. When commanding an approved medical teaching hospital, directs or supervises a coordinated professional graduate training program for residents and interns in accordance with established policies. When commanding an independent medical installation which constitutes a separate post or station, directs security, supply and transportation facilities, housing and construction, and service activities, examination of requisitions for supplies and property, and allotment of funds.

Must have extensive professional and military medical experience.

Postgraduate training or experience in hospital administration desirable.

Must be a graduate of a medical school or college approved by the Surgeon General.

b. The following changes are made in section I:

- (1) Change the fourth sentence in paragraph 14 to read—"Such recommendations should be forwarded through channels to the Adjutant General in accordance with the following form:

TO: The Adjutant General, **Personnel Research and Procedures Branch, Attn, AGPP-M, Washington 25, D. C.**"

- (2) Change the last sentence in paragraph 15 to read—"The provisions of paragraph 2b (2) are not applicable to Medical Corps or Dental Corps officers. For instructions concerning classification and changes in classification of these officers refer to section IV, TM 12-425A, July 1947."

3. DELETIONS

a. The following deletions are made in section I:

- (1) Delete fifth sentence and word "also" from sixth sentence of paragraph 3c.

b. The military occupational speciality, UNIT ADMINISTRATOR (2123) will be awarded only to warrant officers. Reference will be made to

graph 1 above, is warranted under the provisions of paragraphs 67 and 73, TM 12-425A as amended. However, column (2) below merely lists selected examples of authorized military occupational specialties under which incumbents who perform duties covered by one of the newly established military occupational specialties are likely to be currently classified, and is not to be construed as limiting the number or kind of military occupational specialties from which award of a new military occupational specialty may need to be made. Furthermore, commissioned and warrant officers previously awarded one of the military occupational specialties listed in column (2) below, will not be given automatically one of the new military occupational specialties. The qualifications of all commissioned and warrant officer personnel who are performing duties covered by one of the new military occupational specialties will be reviewed and evaluated as indicated above, regardless of their present classification.

The military occupational specialties of RADIOLOGICAL DEFENSE MEDICAL OFFICER (3004), AIR FORCE STAFF SURGEON (3161), FLIGHT SURGEON (3162), and ORAL PATHOLOGIST (3177), will be awarded in accordance with the provisions of section IV (Classification of Medical and Dental Corps Officers), TM 12-425A, as amended.

d. The military occupational speciality, RADIOLOGICAL DEFENSE ENGINEER (7330) will be awarded only to officers who have successfully completed the prescribed post-graduate training in bio-radiology, or who have equivalent training and experience acceptable to the Department of the Army or the Department of the Air Force. However, since selection for the training or possession of the equivalent experience, referred to above, depends upon academic and other personal qualifications of individual officers, who are currently classified in many diverse military occu-

pational specialties, no uniformly applicable conversion instructions can be given.

e. When review indicates the suitability of changing the military occupational speciality classification of a commissioned or warrant officer, as outlined in a, b, c, and d above, necessary action will be taken to award the new military occupational speciality, designate it as primary where appropriate, and amend qualification cards and personnel rosters, according to the procedures outlined in sections III, IV, V, and VI, TM 12-425A. In addition, tables of organization and equipment and tables of distribution in process of being revised or developed will be reviewed, and those positions requiring the services of commissioned or warrant officers, who perform duties covered by one of the new military occupational specialties contained in paragraph 1 above, will be properly identified by the appropriate new military occupational speciality code.
