TM 12-406, 8 February 1946, is changed as follows:

1. ADDITIONS

a. The following is added at the end of section I:

16. Coding of Warrant Officers

(Appendix III contains * * * AR 610-10 and 610-15.) In order to provide a separate primary military occupational specialty classification for each warrant officer category authorized in Department of the Army Pamphlet No. 20-25, "Appointment of Warrant Officers to the Regular Army and United States Air Force," the following military occupational specialties for warrant officer classification only, are added:

17. Additional Qualification of Parachutist

a. All corresponding positions in the airborne and standard infantry divisions will be classified in the same military occupational specialty classification.

b. Those positions which require the additional qualification of "parachutist" will be identified by a prefix "7" to the four digit SSN for commissioned officers in the same manner as is now authorized for enlisted personnel (par. 2d, sec. I, TM 12-327, 12 Jul 44, as amended by C 5, 26 Jul 49).

c. The following titles, codes, and specifications for military occupational specialties are added in numerical sequence to section III:

INFANTRY HEAVY WEAPONS
INSTRUCTOR (2724)

Trains and instructs infantry personnel in the employment of crew served infantry heavy weapons in both offensive and defensive operations and the use of infantry individual light weapons for self-defense.

Gives instructions in such subjects as limitations and capabilities of infantry heavy weapons and their ammunition, emplacement of the .30 caliber heavy machine gun, message center procedure for field use, defense against chemical attack, first aid, and field sanitation, care and maintenance of equipment, recognition of enemy personnel, equipment and matériel, preparation and use of terrain and contour maps, forward reconnaissance, 81-mm mortar, neutralization fire, use of cover and concealment, point and area targets, and coordination and control of target assignments.

Presents field and classroom individual and group demonstrations on such subjects as employment of the rocket launcher, emplacement of an 81-mm mortar, transporting a 75-mm rifle in rough terrain, care and maintenance of weapons,

use of hand and arm signals, and fire observation and correction.

Trains infantry personnel in squad, section, and platoon tactics by planning and conducting tactical problems and exercises such as fire and movement in rough terrain, orientation by terrain maps, establishing platoon communications, forward reconnaissance, and in all other specific duties of personnel in an infantry heavy weapons squad, section, and platoon.

Must know infantry tactics as applied to small units. Must be familiar with organization and tactics of supporting units such as artillery and armor.

Must be familiar with teaching methods and principles.

Note. This MOS is for warrant officer classification only.

INFANTRY LIGHT WEAPONS INSTRUCTOR (2742)

Trains and instructs infantry personnel in the employment of crew served infantry light weapons in both offensive and defensive operations against an enemy force, and in the use of infantry individual light weapons for defensive and offensive action.

Gives lectures and presents visual aid material to infantry personnel concerning such subjects as limitations and capabilities of the 60-mm mortar, emplacement of the .30 caliber light machine gun, encountering enemy forces in hand-to-hand combat, message center procedure for field use, defense against chemical attack, field sanitation, guard duty, care and maintenance of equipment, recognition of enemy personnel, equipment and matériel, preparation and use of terrain and contour maps, forward reconnaissance, and destruction fire with the 57-mm rifle.

Presents demonstrations on such subjects as employment of the .30 caliber rifle in the assault, use of judo tactics and unarmed defense, use of special light weapons such as flame thrower and automatic rifle, maintenance of infantry individual field equipment, use of hand and arm signals, fire correction with multiple targets.

Trains in all specific duties concerned with squad, section, and platoon tactics by planning and conducting tactical problems and exercises such as fire and movement in rough terrain, orientation by terrain maps, establishing platoon com-

munications, fire observation, bivouac, on the march, at the halt, and offensive and defensive operations.

Must know infantry tactics as applied to small units. Must be familiar with organization and tactics of supporting units such as artillery and armor.

Must be familiar with teaching methods and principles.

Note. This MOS is for warrant officer classification only.

ARTILLERY INTELLIGENCE AND OPERATIONS INSTRUCTOR (2745)

Gives instructions in field artillery fire direction, intelligence, operations, and liaison personnel assigned to a training division, service school, or a civilian component, in performance of their duties to insure that each individual is technically qualified in his grade and military occupational specialty. Employs all methods of military instruction and training such as lectures, demonstrations, individual and group performance, and examinations.

Trains all personnel in the use and interpretation of maps and aerial photographs and in the use of conventional signs and symbols. Demonstrates and teaches the preparation of overlays. Instructs in the organization and employment of all ground combat arms, with special emphasis on field artillery. Trains individuals in the techniques of telephone and radiotelephone operation, and in the use of prearranged codes. Demonstrates the construction of simple field fortifications. Trains personnel in the principles of camouflage, using natural or artificial materials. Acquaints all personnel with the sequence and meaning of fire commands.

Trains fire direction personnel in subjects and duties involved in fire direction. Teaches basic mathematics and the use of simple formulae. Instructs in the duties of the battery recorder. Demonstrates and trains personnel in the preparation and maintenance of firing charts, including plotting by coordinates or sensings, and measurement of range and direction. Instructs in restitution of targets from aerial photographs. Instructs in determination of altitudes and angles of site. Trains personnel in the solution of meteorological messages and the determination of corrections from registration and meteorological

data. Demonstrates and instructs in the use of tabular and graphic firing tables. Instructs in the conversion of firing data and sensings to fire commands.

Trains intelligence and operations personnel in their duties. Instructs in the preparation and maintenance of situation and operations maps. Demonstrates and instructs in the collection, processing, and use of friendly and hostile information. Instructs in the collection, compilation, and distribution of counter-battery information. Trains personnel in the preparation of intelligence, operations, and training reports.

Instructs liaison and forward observer personnel in scouting and patrolling. Conducts classes in intelligence observation including recognition of foreign uniforms and equipment. Instructs in the preparation of messages and intelligence reports. Trains sections in the establishment of observation posts and in adjustment of fire by forward observation methods.

Must know tactical intelligence and operations of basic artillery units; must be familiar with artillery survey methods; must be familiar with organization and tactics of supported units such as infantry and armor.

Note. This MOS is for warrant officer classification only.

ARMORED INTELLIGENCE AND OPERATIONS INSTRUCTOR (2748)

Trains and instructs armored personnel engaged in intelligence, operations, and reconnaissance duties involving the collection, preparation, and dissemination of information pertaining to the activities of friendly and enemy troops, the state of training and condition of equipment of subordinate units, and the preparation of training and tactical plans.

Trains reconnaissance personnel in the methods and techniques of scouting and patrolling, dismounted and mounted, individually or as a unit. Instructs in the procedures of collecting intelligence information and the various procedures used in communicating such information to proper authority.

Trains personnel in the correlation, interpretation, evaluation, and dissemination of such intelligence information as is obtained by reconnaissance units. Instructs in the preparation, use, and maintenance of maps, sketches, aerial photographs, and other operational information. In-

structs individuals in encoding and decoding of intelligence messages, and the proper methods of interrogation of prisoners of war.

Teaches operation section personnel the preparation of operations and situations maps, the use of intelligence information as it pertains to operational planning, and the preparation of training plans, combat orders, and the tactical use of tanks, armored cars, and similar unit equipment.

Must be familiar with teaching methods and principles. Must know tactical intelligence and operations of basic armored units. Must have thorough knowledge of armored reconnaissance.

Note. This MOS is for warrant officer classification only.

INFANTRY RECONNAISSANCE, INTELLIGENCE, AND OPERATIONS INSTRUCTOR (2750)

Trains and instructs in infantry intelligence and reconnaissance, and in the organization, operation, training, and tactics of an infantry regiment.

Gives instructions in such subjects as collection and preparation for presentation of information pertaining to the deployment, location, and activities of friendly and enemy troops; preparation of training and tactical plans; collection of intelligence information from subordinate units; keeping an operations journal; use of training films; seeking, observing, and reporting combat intelligence information; terrain features; forward reconnaissance in mountain terrain; questioning prisoners of war; cover and concealment in enemy territory; avoiding ambush; use of signal and communication devices; judging bridge and ford capacity; scouting and patrolling; planning a reconnaissance mission; and mounted patrolling.

Presents field and classroom individual and group demonstrations on such subjects as inspection for state of training and condition of equipment of subordinate units, recording of intelligence information on an operations map, preparation of map overlays and sketches, topographic drafting, fixed observation post operation, challenge and password procedures, command of a dismounted combat reconnaissance patrol, and gathering and disseminating of intelligence information.

Trains infantry personnel in squad, section, and platoon reconnaissance tactics by planning and

conducting tactical problems and exercises such as preparation of reconnaissance and operational reports, photo-interpretation, range, terrain and camouflage observation, use of signal operating instructions for a battalion, encoding and decoding of messages and verification of intelligence information.

Must know tactical intelligence and operations of basic infantry units. Must know infantry reconnaissance.

Must know tactical intelligence and operations of basic infantry units. Must know infantry reconnaissance.

Must be familiar with teaching methods and principles.

Note. This MOS is for warrant officer classification only.

NURSE, ARMY HEALTH SERVICE (3431)

Performs specialized nursing duties in Army Health Nursing Service program. Works with dependents of military personnel to promote a well rounded family health service.

Under direction of a medical officer, instructs and supervises a responsible person in home care of patient. Explains medical instructions to patient and family. Aids in obtaining help for physiological and psychological problems affecting family health by referral to specific welfare agencies. Teaches and demonstrates measures for prevention and control of communicable diseases. Implements sound principles of prenatal care, maternal hygiene and care of new born. Uses lecture and demonstration teaching methods both in classroom and home. Supervises care of health of infant, preschool child, and adult through office and home visits. Supervises operation of a school health program in coordination with school

administrators. Makes follow-up visits to convalescent patients as designated by medical officer. Initiates and posts all records necessary to carry on a successful health program.

Must be a graduate registered nurse from a school of nursing approved by the Surgeon General.

Must have successfully completed one of the following educational requirements:

- (1) A minimum of 2 years' experience under a qualified nursing supervisor in a Public Health nursing agency in which family health work is emphasized.
- (2) One year's program of study at a university which offers a course in Public Health nursing; plus an additional 6 months supervised experience in a Public Health nursing agency.
- (3) Graduate from a university school offering a degree in nursing with a program approved by the Surgeon General.
- (4) A baccalaureate degree with a major in Public Health nursing.

b. Specifications and titles for SALVAGE OFFICER (4600), CHEMICAL OFFICER (7314), and INTELLIGENCE STAFF OFFICER, COMBAT (G-2, A-2, S-2) (9301), and speci-

cations for COUNTERINTELLIGENCE OFFICER (CIC) (9302) and INTELLIGENCE OFFICER (9307) respectively, are changed in section III as follows:

PROPERTY DISPOSAL OFFICER (4600)

Supervises the receipt, handling, and disposition of scrap, salvaged material, surplus property, abandoned private property and uneconomically repairable supplies and equipment.

Acts for the commanding officer on all property disposal and supply economy matters within his purview. Is not accountable for property turned in for disposal. Is responsible at all times for the proper storage and disposition of property turned over to him.

Prepares and maintains records upon receipt of property which will enable inspecting officers or auditors to trace property from receipt to final disposition. Examines turned-in property for prior turn-in reclaimability or repairability aspects and reports findings to installation commander. Completes donation action on property requested by authorized agencies under appropriate law and makes property which will be exchanged in payment in full or part for serviceable items of like character available to purchasing and contracting officers. Prior to effecting disposal, reviews the inventory of property on hand and determines property which should be sold as items, property which should be sold for basic content only, property which should be sold as waste, and then supervises the breakdown of inventory into commercially acceptable groupings. Supervises preparation of invitations for bids or makes necessary arrangements for sale of property by other authorized methods. May be designated as contract officer for sale of property. Maintains lists of prospective bidders and supervises distribution of invitations for bids. Receives all funds from sales and prepares necessary forms and reports to account for proper disposition of proceeds. Prepares and maintains records of each sale and authorizes payment of sales expense. Prepares reports of the activity as required. Makes necessary findings of fact and prepares supporting documents necessary for government defense in case of claims against the government arising from sale of property.

Should be familiar with commercial methods of classification, sorting, storage and general reclamation of waste materials.

Military experience, including training in station supply and stock control, is essential. Should have completed course in salvage and property disposal. Should have good knowledge of mili-

tary supplies, equipment, accounting, and storage methods.

Civilian experience in buying, selling, contract law, and reclamation of salvage desirable.

CHEMICAL OFFICER, STAFF (7314)

Advises commander and staff on establishment, maintenance, and application of defensive and offensive actions concerned with chemical warfare, biological warfare, and radiological defense; recommends training of unit personnel; evaluates and disseminates technical intelligence; supervises preparation of reports to higher headquarters; and inspects assigned or attached units for adequacy of training and equipment pertaining to these specialities.

Prepares, plans and recommends chemical, biological, and radiological training and operational activities. Interprets directives from higher echelons and recommends or directs required action. Advises commander on plans for security and protective measures employed by the command to minimize effectiveness of enemy chemical, biological, and radiological attack. Informs commander of Chemical Corps logistical support requirements for the command. Establishes and controls Chemical Corps supply activities within the command. Conducts inspections of assigned or attached units to determine adequacy of training and condition of Chemical Corps equipment. Evaluates chemical, biological, and radiological technical intelligence data. Plans for and supervises the collection, processing, and dissemination of chemical, biological, and radiological technical intelligence pertaining to enemy activities. Determines suitability and recommends employment of specific kinds of munitions in offensive actions. Recommends plans for employment of incendiary material and smoke and of authorized toxic means of warfare. Exercises operational control over Chemical Corps troops assigned or attached to the command. Directs preparation and approves plans for chemical, biological, and radiological training of individuals, specialists, and units of the command. Supervises assigned or attached Chemical Corps units to assure proper technical and tactical performance; makes necessary inspections to insure proper execution of SOP's and operational orders pertaining to his speciality.

Must have thorough knowledge of tactics and techniques of chemical warfare, biological war-

fare, and radiological defense. Must have thorough knowledge of capabilities and limitations of Chemical Corps equipment. Must know how to identify and interpret significance of intelligence data pertaining to his field. Must know how to interpret weather reports in relation to the effects of weather in the use of smokes or toxics. Must know how to analyze situation maps and battle orders. Must know staff procedure, including the preparation of estimates, orders, and reports pertaining to Chemical Corps activities, of the command to which assigned.

Completion of appropriate courses of the Chemical Corps school desirable.

INTELLIGENCE STAFF OFFICER— COMBAT (G-2, S-2) (9301)

Plans for, and prepares orders pertaining to, collection, evaluation, interpretation, and distribution of information of enemy and counterintelligence activities, and keeps commanding officer informed regarding enemy's situation and capabilities.

Collects, evaluates, and disseminates all enemy information obtained by military intelligence units. Informs commanding officer regarding enemy location, strength, and intentions. Maintains liaison with other intelligence services. Establishes unit intelligence observation posts. Intercepts and solves simple, tactical enemy messages. Supervises and trains scouts, observers, and staff personnel in intelligence functions and in counterintelligence activities. Obtains, prepares, and transmits maps of terrain.

May assist operations, training, and reconnaissance officers in performance of their duties. May handle public relations work, regulating activities of press correspondents and dissemination of information to the public.

When assigned as Counterintelligence Staff Officer, acts as staff advisor to the Intelligence Officer in coordinating activities of counterintelligence agencies. Prepares policies, plans, procedures, and orders designed to counteract intelligence efforts of a foreign or hostile power. Maintains liaison with appropriate local and federal investigative agencies or similar agencies of friendly countries. Supervises preparation of counterintelligence plans, and coordinates activities pertaining to censorship, countersubversion, countersabotage, counterespionage, and security measures

pertaining to safeguarding of military information and troop movements. In coordination with Provost Marshal and Civil Affairs Military Government Officer, reviews counterintelligence measures in civil and military security, and the Army aspects of port, airport, and frontier security.

Favorable background investigation and clearance by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, General Staff, United States Army, is essential. Successful completion of a course of training conducted by the Counter Intelligence Corps and knowledge of the enemy's language, psychology, characteristics, tactics, and strategy are highly desirable.

COUNTERINTELLIGENCE OFFICER (CIC) (9302)

Collects and evaluates information pertaining to enemy intelligence activity, sabotage, or subversive activities.

Organizes and supervises security surveys and investigations. Reviews, evaluates and forwards counterintelligence reports. Makes recommendations regarding counterintelligence activities. Establishes liaison with local and Federal investigative agencies or similar agencies of friendly countries. Makes recommendations for, and conducts and supervises installation and operation of, countersubversive measures, counterespionage systems, or countersabotage activities.

Carries out assigned operational missions concerned with counteracting intelligence efforts of a foreign or hostile power. Prepares Counter Intelligence Corps portion of counterintelligence plan for security and safeguarding of information, and troop movement security. In coordination with Provost Marshal and Civil Affairs Military Government Officer, reviews specific counterintelligence measures relative to civil and military security and the Army aspects of port, airport, and frontier security.

May be responsible for indoctrination of personnel in security measures and safeguarding of military information, or for the planning of such programs.

(For duties when assigned as Counterintelligence Staff Officer see military occupational specialties for Intelligence Staff Officer—Combat (G-2, S-2) (9301) and Intelligence Officer (9307.)

Must have successfully completed a course of training conducted by the Counter Intelligence

Corps, or received constructive credit for training courses as prescribed by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, General Staff, United States Army. Must be familiar with investigative procedures and policies. Should have thorough knowledge of the language and political institutions of one or more foreign countries. Should be a college graduate with a degree in law desirable.

Military experience in post intelligence operations or staff experience in intelligence planning, and civilian experience in legal, investigative, auditing, or journalistic work are desirable. Favorable background investigation and clearance by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, General Staff, United States Army, is essential.

INTELLIGENCE OFFICER (9307)

Directs intelligence and counterintelligence programs at a military installation, and advises commander on all intelligence matters affecting security of the installation.

Investigates cases of possible sabotage, espionage, and subversive activities. Interviews employment applicants regarding loyalty and citizenship, and establishes records and files of all persons investigated. Maintains liaison with military intelligence agencies or police in connection with sabotage. Issues confidential instructions to persons concerned.

When assigned as Counterintelligence Staff Officer, acts as staff advisor to Intelligence Officer in

If an additional military occupational specialty is to be awarded, or if the conversion of a primary military occupational specialty is involved, procedures outlined in section V, SR 605-105-1, will govern.
